

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Recently *The Chronicle of Higher Education* published its list of "America's Fastest Growing Colleges." This wasn't a list for which Huntingdon had forewarning or could prepare or compete. We were delighted to see Huntingdon at number 12 among all colleges in the country on a list that measured simply growth in day and evening programs between 2002 and 2012, a period when Huntingdon's enrollment jumped from 594 to 1118. Even more gratifying: We were first in the Deep South.

Why? As you'll see in the story on page 12, reforged connections with the United Methodist Church, growth in NCAA-III athletic programs, growth in academic programs, and expansion of evening programs from two to fourteen sites are ready answers to that question. These are the new factors that came into play.



INTERNSHIPS: WORKING THE REAL WORLD

To learn more about their fields and to focus on their futures, Hawks spread their wings and get their feathers dirty.

Marks Abernathy '15 is living his dream—or at least he's close. Three days a week he interns with the Federal Marshals Service in downtown Montgomery. The office serves warrants, transports prisoners, and apprehends fugitives, and Marks has skimmed his shirtsleeves in all of those tasks. "I love it. I love every minute of it. This is my dream job."

Knowing that accounting is one of the most sought-after majors by agencies such as the Federal Marshals and the Secret Service led to his choice of major in the first place. This semester Marks is getting a chance to

see what it would be like to live that original dream, and he knows he's right on track.

Marks is working in a Hawks on the Hill internship, one of dozens of Huntingdon students who have worked in public service positions through political campaigns, law firms, nonprofit organizations, federal or state agencies or legislative offices. According to **Fran Taylor**, director of Huntingdon's Center for Career and Vocation, regardless of where the work takes place, that foray into the real world is a key factor in post-graduate success.

"Internships are valuable for students for a number of reasons," says Taylor. "They provide insight into what tasks are necessary for success in certain jobs or career fields; they inform the student what he or she does or does not like to do and/or where skills are strong or weak; they develop job skills relevant to the workplace that are different from classroom knowledge; and they give resume-worthy experience that employers and graduate schools are seeking. We encourage every student to work in his or her field while they are students—whether the

positions are paid or unpaid, credit or noncredit, volunteer, mission-driven, professional or service-oriented, and whether the student finds his or her own experiences or the college places them in open positions, the life lessons taught by real-world work are irreplaceable."

Huntingdon faculty have long been praised for their ability to get to know students and to steer them toward career paths that fit the students' personalities, talents, and skills. The establishment of Huntingdon's Center for Career and Vocation provided a partnership for faculty in their quest to assist students and for students who are motivated to do all they can to be ready for life after araduation. The CCV assists students with essential job-seeking skills, such as resume development, interviewing skills, graduate school and career searches, and aptitude testing. Encouraging students to seek and land great internship placements tops the list of CCV priorities because, as the adage goes, jobs beget jobs.


Ironically, it was another internship experience that led Marks to seek his current placement. A few months of interning with an accounting firm, during which his only human interaction was with their tax documents, quickly informed him that a desk job was not his game.

Chemistry major **Storm McWhorter** '15 intended a career in pharmacy and chose Huntingdon partly because of the College's 14-year track record of 100% placement into pharmacy schools. "My adviser, **Dr. Maureen (Kendrick) Murphy** '78, never told me I shouldn't go into pharmacy, but she knew that I was the type of person who needs more interaction with people than a pharmacist usually gets," says Storm, whose effervescent personality is evident from the first smile. Dr. Murphy pointed out other internship placements and encouraged Storm to apply.

"Between my sophomore and junior years, I shadowed an anesthesiologist, but I realized that I wanted to know more about the patients and talk with them more," says Storm. Dr. Murphy introduced her to the Rural Health Internship available through the University of Alabama-Huntsville. She

applied and was accepted for summer 2014, and that's where she found her niche.

"Family doctors in rural towns really build connections with the families they serve," says Storm. "[As a rural doctor] I'm not just giving a diagnosis, I'm helping someone's life. I found out there's nothing I'd rather do than be a doctor, and nowhere I'd rather be than in a smaller town."

For Marcus Burwell '15, a biology major, an internship in Alaska during summer 2014 solidified his desire for a career in biomedical engineering (specifically, prosthetics) or higher primate research. "I absolutely adore being in a lab. I love the process. I love that I can prove or disprove something rather than just listen to opinions about it."

The Philadelphia native and former Hawks defensive back was first interested in marine science when he came to Huntingdon, so his adviser, Dr. Paul Gier, professor of biology, introduced him to the Marine Environmental Sciences Consortium, of which Huntingdon is a member, and to the opportunity to study during summer 2013 at Dauphin Island Sea Lab. He followed that experience in 2014 by applying for several Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU) placements around the country and was one of 10 chosen (from about 500 applicants) for a placement in Anchorage, Alaska. There, he spent 10 weeks studying the cardiac systems of turtles—specifically, the importance of the sarcoplasmic reticulum in turtle atrium contractions. "Science is fun and interesting if you want to know why and how things work. That's the drive that you need," says Marcus. He also found out it's the drive that he has.

A new REU opportunity at Alabama State

University attracted India Chaney '15, whose 2014 summer was devoted to cancer research in ASU's nanobiotechnology center. India looked at the use of PLGA (poly-DL-glycolide) nanoparticles as anticancer drug delivery agents. A biology major from Montgomery, India used her research to develop a poster presentation she delivered at nanobiotechnology summits in Tuscaloosa, Ala., and San Antonio, Texas. "Internships broaden your horizons and give you hands-on experience that you wouldn't otherwise get," says India, who adds that her internship gave her the chance to use high-level research equipment not normally available to undergraduate students. Her goal is to continue her research at the graduate level and then seek admission to medical school.

Kathleen Penney '15, a psychology and biology double-major from Madison, Ala., spent the summer of 2014 working on oncology drug development research with Celsion-EGEN, an associate company of HudsonAlpha. "I was specifically looking at if the enzyme enolase 2 is within a vesicle or not," she says. "Since Celsion-EGEN is focused on nucleic acid based anti-cancer therapeutics, this discovery could prove very promising to the future of drug delivery."

Her training was a week-long boot camp. "Boot camp was a great experience for me because most of the experiments that we did as practice were ones I had been exposed to before in labs at Huntingdon," says Kathleen. Although she plans a career in clinical psychology, she believes the internship was beneficial to her career growth. "I will be forever grateful for all of the techniques and information I learned over the summer, as well as the people I got the opportunity to meet."

Students majoring in religion and related areas are placed regularly in internships with or through churches or religious organizations. Many find that their faith lives grow right along with their professional outlook.

Exploring an early calling to the field of ministry, Lexie Ofe '17 interned with Disciples Home Missions at Union Avenue Christian Church in St. Louis, a national position that required training in Michigan and debriefing in Kentucky. She led visiting mission groups on an exploration of issues of racial and socioeconomic justice concerns through work at the church and in nearly a dozen other sites around St. Louis during summer 2014. Planting, weeding, and caring for the land at several urban farms and with the Sunflower Project (see photo, page 3) germinated an interest in both sustainable agriculture and whole-person health; while interactions at homeless shelters, prisons, day care centers and other sites fueled an already burning passion for learning about and addressing justice issues. "I know now that in my profession I have to focus on issues of justice," says Lexie. "I have to talk about things that matter with people who care about things that matter, or I will be bored to tears."

Kristen Curtis '16 has spent several summers working with Service Over Self (SOS) camps in the Southeast. Her summer 2014 placement was in inner city Memphis, where she hosted mission groups who refurbished homes for disadvantaged families, many

of whom were immigrants trying to make new lives in America. She spent much of the sweltering Memphis summer replacing rotten roofs. "I wanted to do something that was totally out of my comfort zone—to open my eyes to other ways to serve," says Kristen. "It caused me to see the beauty in brokenness. We all can seem like we've got it all together, but we're all just leaky old houses who have different issues and needs ... and no one is more broken or better than anyone else. We're all God's children." Now interning with First UMC-Montgomery in a position that is half respite ministry and half youth-oriented, Kristen's internships have affirmed for her a desire to work with international populations for a non-profit organization.

Oklahoma native and Hawks tennis player Trey Pirtle '16 followed his teammate and friend Seth McClendon '16 to the Philippines during summer 2014, where they worked with Kids International Ministries, a pilgrimage Seth has made several times. KIM runs ministry projects that include a shelter for abused women and girls, two schools, and a pregnancy clinic. Several times a week he and his partners ventured into the nearby tent cities for "feedings," providing hungry villagers with nourishment. He also worked in Tacloban, an area decimated by Typhoon Yolanda. Trey's family owns a fiber optic cable business, the knowledge from which he used to set up several of the KIM ministry projects with computers and the infrastructure necessary for networking and Internet. A communication studies major, Trey created videos about his experiences that are linked on the Huntingdon website at http://www.huntingdon.edu/backstory.

"I've been on a lot of mission trips and seen great poverty," says Trey. "In this place, it was about building relationships. The things you learn by talking with people expand so much of what you know about the world. I have a better understanding of cultures, regions, ideas, and why people do the things they do." About himself, Trey learned, "I like being a middleman to make a difference. Being a third world IT guy doesn't sound too bad, actually."

Involvement with a College group or team can have many of the same benefits as an internship, which is especially true for music majors who play in the band and sing in the choir and for sport studies majors who are student-athletes. Ryan Dean '16 came to Huntingdon having had only one music class in his tenth arade year in his small town high school in Uriah, Alabama, "I was football, basketball, and track and I wasn't in the band or choir," says Ryan. Still, with a father who is a music minister and a lifelong love of music, he came to HC to major in music and to be part of the track team. When the track team was discontinued during his freshman year, Adam Murphy, assistant director of bands, encouraged Ryan, who played piano by ear and could not read music, to play for the band. "I guess it's that burn in you—I just wanted to do it. I iust love music."

Joining the band and then the choir not only fed his passion, but also confirmed his career decision. Now, he's interning with the Frazer UMC choir, which reinforces his learning in sight-reading and conducting. He plans to march in his father's footsteps. "At first I didn't want to do this internship. But my mom told me I needed to do it. Now I would encourage anyone to do an internship. It teaches you so much—from conducting to diction to mixing of voices and instruments—and there's so much to learn. I say do all you can; learn all you can."

Huntingdon sport studies and physical education majors have abundant opportunities to gain hands-on experience without even leaving campus. The Department of Sport Science and Physical Education involves students in athletic training experiences with Huntingdon teams in both contact and non-contact sports. Students learn about working with special populations through the department's Adapted Physical Education classes that bring special education students from a local school to campus for monthly basic skill development. There are placements available in the on-site physical therapy clinic. Through a grant from the Alabama Commission on Higher Education, the department also runs the Ability Sport Network, after-school team and individual sports for youth ages 6–20 who are not able to participate in school sports because of physical impairments. ASN offers wheelchair basketball, tennis, bocce, and other sports, and Huntingdon students run the training activities, help coach the Red Wings team, maintain the chairs, schedule and officiate at the games, and work with the student-athletes.

Teacher education students each complete a practicum experience and an internship as part of their degree requirements. Kayla Causby '15, an elementary education/collaborative special education major, will do her student teaching internship during spring 2015, when she will take over a classroom for 20 days. In the fall of 2014 she is completing her practicum, during which "I do whatever the teacher needs me to do, teach four lessons, grade papers, help in the classroom, make the teacher's life easier." The practicum is preparing her for the internship. She's learned that confidence is the key. To prepare for her internship, she knows she has to read ahead, stay organized, and stay on top of classroom management.

Greenville, S.C., native Tyler Chaffee '15 already runs his own business, Southern Gulf Clothiers, but as a digital art major he faced strong competition for the premier business internship in the state during summer 2014: working with PowerSouth's Montgomery office in economic development. After landing the role, he found his graphic design skills in as much demand as his ability to develop relationships within the business community. The position taught him far more than he could learn by reading and classroom instruction alone. "Before this experience I had no idea how the system worked. So much time and effort goes into getting a business to come to Alabama or to a specific community. I got to experience all of the behind-the-scenes work." He met key business leaders—contacts and connections for his future—some of whom have already told him to call them after he has his degree. Tyler also works an ongoing internship with Deep South Apparel, for whom he designs T-shirts. The demands on his time are further complicated in the spring when his men's tennis season kicks in. To Tyler, though, the sleep sacrifice is justifiable, "I feel like you need an internship if you want to find a job out of college; it definitely puts you on top of the pile. You have to have it."

Jeremiah Stone '16 hooked the highly competitive Young & Free Alabama Spokester

internship with Guardian Credit Union, his second internship placement, in which he serves as an advocate for the under-25 age group during the 2014-15 academic year. It's a full-time job, but the hours are worked around his school schedule. Each day the communication studies major posts a blog about various topics that relate to his generation, and he frequently prepares and conducts financial literacy seminars for collegeaged students. During the spring semester 2014 Jeremiah interned with Alabama Governor Robert Bentley's press office, where

he researched topics to help construct the governor's speeches and wrote proclamations and commendations, among other tasks. He says the insights gained from two completely different settings had a deep impact on his career direction.

"The bottom line is, internships mean jobs," says Huntingdon President J. Cameron West. "The more real-world experience we

can offer our students, the more they will be prepared for their professions after they graduate. As we say here, the success of every student is the focus of everything we do, and internships are an important way to foster student success and to enhance their employment and graduate school placement."

Carlee Gardner '15, an accounting major who has completed one internship and will do another during spring 2015, says that internships have benefits deeper than steering one's career ship toward the calmest seas. "Internships are helpful in the classroom, because having already applied some of the principles the teacher is showing us makes it easier to grasp what the teacher is saying, especially for topics we've never covered before. I've also developed better and more relevant accounting skills and I'm familiar with the terminology that accountants use but that we don't use in class."

Internships aren't difficult for accounting majors to find, but they are hard to keep because of the brutal demands on the intern's time. Huntsville native Shirin Torabineiad '15 ought to know—she's done internships each semester and summer she's been at Huntingdon, and each one has honed her career focus. The state Key Club president while she was in high school, Shirin has spent summers interning with Kiwanis International, for which she was in charge of the Key Club's election process—from bylaws to application. Her current position in the estate and trust department of WarrenAverett, a job she has held since spring 2014, requires a commitment of 40 well-paid hours per week in addition to her school demands. Her first internships—with youth, as a pastoral intern, and as a productions intern with First UMC-Montgomery—were important stepping stones on her career path. "When I didn't know what I wanted to do, they helped me figure it out. At first I thought I wanted to do ministry but by the end of my experiences I knew I wanted to do fulltime accounting. All of the hard work I've done has really paid off. I already have job possibilities—one with an accounting firm and one with a business. It's comforting to know that as a senior I'm not even looking for jobs, jobs are looking for me."

ALEXIS WINEMAN: MOVING ON TO A NEW STAGE

Students often say they chose Huntingdon and they stayed because it feels like home—like family. One student said recently, "It's like everyone's got your back." For Alexis Wineman '17, that aspect of Huntingdon couldn't be more true—or more important.

Most young women in the pageant circuit compete numerous times, working their way from festival or county fair to the state's title. Not so for **Alexis Wineman '17**, but maybe that's because she was never in the circuit in the first place. The title of Miss Montana crowned her first official pageant. She competed against 11 women, her talent a comedic monologue.

"I thought it was something I couldn't do," says Alexis. "I thought of myself, for lack of a better term, as 'retarded' as a kid. Now I hate that term. Beauty pageants aren't for people like me, I thought."

Luckily, voters didn't agree. Alexis' second official pageant was the Miss America pageant in January 2013, from which she came away with another title: "America's Choice." That designation, voted upon online by people all over the world, landed her in the Top 15. Not bad for a pageant novice.

The walk across the stage to accept each title was far shorter than the walk it took her to reach those stages. Alexis, the first Miss America candidate to have been diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder, chose her diagnosis as her platform. Who better

to understand and communicate ASD's challenges?

"I always knew I was different—something was off—but cruelty [from other students] didn't set in until third grade. Until then, everyone let me do my own thing, which involved sitting down and doing nothing."

When Alexis says "third," the word rhymes with "could." She still has trouble, after 9 years of speech therapy helped her conquer the B, K, L, long A, and S sounds, with pronouncing the letter R.

Speech, for Alexis, serves as a public representation of the many private struggles created by ASD, which also affects her motor skills and sensory perception. "I couldn't open a door until the first grade. Then I finally learned how to open doors with knobs that were straight bars. I still couldn't do the round knobs, though, until recently. I hate doors."

Maybe that hatred of doors has given her the determination and fight to bust through them, time and again.

Alexis is the older, by two minutes, of twin sisters equally endowed with brilliance, beauty, and boldness. Her younger sister, Amanda '15, came to Huntingdon first, as Montana's Distinguished Young Woman in 2012, the same year Alexis won the Miss Montana title. The twins have two older siblings, Danielle and Nick, who have each graduated from college and are working actors. The family is tight-knit. Alexis credits her siblings and parents, Kimberley Butterworth and Michael Wineman, for championing her through a difficult childhood and adolescence. "Hope from a stranger is only going to go so far," says Alexis. "You need people who are with you and who believe in you to make you do the things you don't want to do—to push you and stretch you out of your comfort zone."

According to the CDC, one child in 68 receives the autism diagnosis—a progression from 1 in 88 just two years ago. ASD affects more boys than girls.

"I have always experienced teasing," says Alexis, "but I took it with a grain of salt. Autism makes you not catch on to social cues. I thought, as long as I can make them laugh, it's fine. Around third grade, I realized there was a difference in the laughter. The confusion frustrated me. That was also the time that I was faced with learning cursive handwriting, with other girls being invited to slumber parties and talking about boys and the year that Amanda was put a grade ahead—so I felt really alone. I paced in circles to calm myself down. There is no thought to pacing, it's self-stimulation. People with autism can't shut their brains off, but they can ignore situations by repeating a behavior that they don't have to think about. So I did that as a kid, though I didn't know I was doing it."

Alexis' frustration and fear erupted into explosive behaviors. With her dad away much of the time on business, Alexis' mom faced the tantrums and other behaviors head-on, taking her to a succession of doctors only to be told that the behaviors were the result of poor parenting. Finally, when Alexis was 11, a pediatric neurologist diagnosed her with a form of autism, borderline Asperger's syndrome. "I was in the seventh grade, and I thought that was close to adulthood, so I knew the diagnosis was too late to do any good. My teachers didn't know what to do with me. I was the first high-functioning student with autism to go through the school system."

At the time, Alexis wanted to be an astronaut. Fascinated by space, she learned all she could about the heavens, sported a NASA jacket, and covered her bedroom walls with pictures of astronauts and galaxies. But for two years her science teacher gave her failing grades because Alexis didn't want to write down her answers. "I could test orally—tell her anything

she wanted to know when asked—but I couldn't write down answers because of the sound of my pencil on a printed test. A piece of paper that has been through a copier has a different sound when you write on it than a plain piece of paper, and it was like fingernails on a chalkboard to me."

One of the effects of ASD is over-stimulation of the senses—such as hearing—resulting from an inability to isolate or regulate the volume of sounds as she hears them. To Alexis, simply sitting in a classroom presents her with a computer's humming, overhead lights buzzing, a fly at the window, keyboards clicking, voices outside the window, the sound of footsteps and voices in the hallway, cars driving past in the parking lot, doors creaking, and yes, even the sound of a pencil on plain paper or printed paper: all of these sounds come to her brain at the same volume

Although other teachers worked with Alexis by giving oral examinations, her science teacher refused.

The discouragement devastated Alexis, who abandoned her love of space permanently. She destroyed and discarded all of her space memorabilia.

In middle school, a crusty coach named Michael Reynolds, "who I always saw smoking and yelling at people—he scared me," issued her a challenge: run, in her older brother's very large footsteps, on the cross country team. "Coach Reynolds would trail us as we ran, playing bagpipe music and saying, 'the only way you're going to get away from this music is to keep running forward.' I could run 10 miles without stopping with that horrible bagpipe music behind me. Every time I want to quit something, I remember that." Coach Reynolds' challenge led to Alexis finding the first place where she felt like she belonged.

Belonging had been a difficult feeling to come by in her early years, and continued to be through middle school. She hid, either literally, by isolating herself from others, or figuratively, by wearing hoodies and big glasses.

That is, until her eighth grade graduation and dance, to which her mother forced her to wear a "Tinkerbell-green poofy cocktail dress" and to brighten her face with makeup. Her first pair of contact lenses, inserted forcefully by her oldest sister, helped her both see and be seen.

"When my name was called to pick up my certificate, there was silence in the room.

No one knew who I was. That's when I realized I had the potential to be pretty, but I didn't use that potential again until after I graduated."

Shunning the impressions of others, Alexis went right back to her hoodies and big glasses as if she were Cinderella at midnight. Again, she closed herself away from others until a ninth grade class change put her sitting right beside Miranda Frick, who would become her first real friend and remains her best friend to this day. "She was the first Goth girl my graduating class of 64 people in Cut Bank ever saw. Miranda taught me that it's okay to be different." When you're dealing with a disorder like autism and all of the respective baggage it brings, that's a heck of a truth to embrace.

Her experience of making friends with Miranda taught Alexis how the process worked, and she soon began making more friends, partly by joining clubs and organizations. Cheerleading forged her way to the front of the crowd. With her mom as coach and Danielle as captain, entering the cheer team was more comfortable to her than it would have been if she had entered a crowd of strangers. By her senior year she was the captain and was amazed when the girls actually listened to her.

Since all three of her siblings had been involved in speech and drama during high school, Alexis decided to give the stage a try. Because of her speech difficulties, mime was the perfect event in which Alexis could compete. She made it all the way to state and found a new place where she felt like she belonged.

Her confidence reinforced, she realized the next step was to speak, so she tried Humorous Oral Interpretation. The first HOI speech she gave became her talent for the Miss America pageant.

Still, none of her accomplishments compares, she says, to her greatest success: graduating from high school. "In my junior or senior year I realized I didn't want to fit the norm of ASD, staying with my parents forever. I wanted to be on my own and support myself. I graduated 13th in my class, just outside the top 10, and I cried my eyes out. Even Miss America didn't top that."

The America's Choice Award during the Miss America Pageant proved to be a culminating moment: a validation of how far she'd come, and a push to keep going.

The pageant propelled her into the position of being the voice of autism—a source of hope for young people who had been diagnosed with ASD. When she received a letter of encouragement from the mother of a boy with ASD who had never spoken, she was humbled to know that she had made a difference. "I didn't mean to become the voice of autism. It just happened."

And it's still happening. Though many predicted that her public appeal would be short-lived, America is still responding. She fields continuous requests to speak to schools and organizations about autism and bullying and to contribute to media efforts on the subject, including an upcoming book for varsity cheerleaders, a book written by and for people diagnosed with ASD, "Been There, Done That, Try This," and a documentary, "Autism in America." She's appeared on the cover of Neurology Now; with her sister, Amanda, in Glamour magazine; in an ABC News special and Good Morning America; as Diane Sawyer's Person of the Week: on Fox & Friends and the Jeff Probst Show; and numerous other programs.

During the summer of 2014, one of her appearances put her on stage with her idol and the world's most prominent

spokesperson for autism, Dr. Temple Grandin, about whom a feature film of the same name was produced by HBO several years ago. "I had to keep pinching myself to believe it was real."

Going to college was a distant and seemingly unachievable dream when Alexis was a child, but Huntingdon provided her the comforts of her twin sister being here; of small classes where student success is the focus; of knowing most other students and being known by them; and of freedom—to lift her wings, catch a new breeze, and fly in small, ever-growing circles. Life, for Alexis, has settled down a bit, yet she's still bursting through new doors at every turn.

Now a communication studies major at Huntingdon—a major she chose because of its difficulty for her—she feels at home. "I know all of my professors here, and all of them know me. I'm not just another face. They care if I'm not there, and they're always willing to help. I can't imagine going to school anywhere else."

No matter which doors Alexis goes through in the future, she wants happiness to be on the other side. "I know it sounds cliché, but I spent a lot of my life being unhappy, so I feel like I owe it to myself. I really do just want to be happy."

PUTTING WAR INTO WORDS MASHAHAMILLON

During three full days in October 2014, Stall-worth Lecturer Masha Hamilton met with students, faculty and staff, sharing stories she witnessed and gathered through 30 years as a journalist, novelist, and humanitarian working in some of the poorest or most conflict-ridden areas of the world.

The 2014 exchange extended beyond the single-night public lecture of the past to individual class sessions and group meetings intended not only to spark students' knowledge of current affairs and recent history, but also to spur critical thinking through inquiry and discussion. **President J. Cameron West** chose Hamilton because of the breadth of topics she could address. "This type of meeting of the minds is the reason for inviting new thinkers to campus, after all," said West. "Masha Hamilton had the perfect background to compel critical thinking and civil discussion around tough issues."

Educated at Brown University, Hamilton began her professional career writing for the Associated Press. After reporting in the states she was asked to become news editor in Israel. During her five years there she covered the first intifada. Moving on to Moscow, she spent five years covering both communism and its collapse in the Soviet Union. She reported from Afghanistan

during and after Taliban control in 2004 and 2008, and from Kenva in 2006. In October 2013 she concluded 16 months as director of communications and public diplomacy for the American embassy in Afghanistan during which such stories as the attacks on Benghazi and Cairo occurred. Along the way she wrote and published five novels: Staircase of a Thousand Steps in 2001, The Distance Between Us in 2004, The Camel Bookmobile in 2007, 31 Hours in 2009, and What Changes Everything in 2013; and founded two nonprofit humanitarian organizations: The Camel Book Drive and the Afghan Women's Writing Project. Her present position is as vice president of communications for Concern Worldwide.

In a General Epistles class, Hamilton led students in a discussion of persecution: how and why it often results from power imbalance, when one group feels threatened by another. In an Honors Religion class, discussion focused on nonviolent response to persecution: can such an approach work? Is violence ever warranted? With a group of communication studies students and faculty, Hamilton answered questions about her career and the professional climate in communication. With a World Literature class, students discussed how words convey the horror, drama, issues—and

even the humor—of war. In a Comparative Politics class, the focus was Afahanistan, its geography, history, political climate, and the effects of war not only on the Afghanis who are fighting, but also on their families, homes, towns, and infrastructure. With a group of students preparing to teach, Hamilton discussed literacy issues around the world, particularly in the world's poorest regions or where removal of access to education is a means by which those in power stay in power. Literacy was the topic, as well, with Honors Program and Leadership Initiative students for an Honors Colloquium. A group of citizens from First United Methodist Church who will be traveling to the Holy Land in 2015 met for lunch with Hamilton to discuss religious and political issues in the Holy Land. The upper-level religion class, Freedom, Autonomy, and Friendship, discussed what happens to autonomy in times of war. Students and faculty in the Women's Center talked about war's effect on women. Hamilton also met with a group of writers and faculty who teach writing. The English honorary **Sigma Tau Delta** organized a children's book drive around her visit, with books donated to the Family Sunshine Center

Her public lecture, "Women, War and Words: Stories of Risks Worth Taking," conveyed human stories from the midst of conflict and hardship—inspiring, compelling, difficult and provocative.

Hamilton's sense of balance and of the nuances of any issue—so few of which are black and white but instead are areas of grey—encouraged listeners to think differently and more deeply about the topics they considered together.

"We all have inspirational people in our lives ... people who have encouraged and inspired us to believe in ourselves," said **Kelly Kahumoku** '14, who was part of the gathering of communication studies students and alumni and who came to the evening lecture. "Masha Hamilton inspired me with her dynamic, thought-provoking stories of her career as a journalist, her pursuits as a literacy advocate, and her transition from news to novels. Most of all, I was impressed by her humility, her generous spirit, and her desire to encourage others."





Huntingdon College named among the country's fastestgrowing colleges

"Huntingdon College is one of the hottest private colleges in the South-and now we have national recognition of that fact," said President J. Cameron West of the news that Huntingdon earned a place on The Chronicle of Higher Education's 2014 list of "Fastest Growing Colleges in America," released in August. Huntingdon is ranked at number 12 among private four-year institutions nationally and number one in the Deep South. The publication recognizes growth in colleges from 2002 to 2012, when Huntingdon's overall enrollment jumped 88 percent, from 594 in fall 2002 to 1118 in fall 2012, including students in traditional day and evening programs.

According to West, there are a number of reasons for the enrollment growth. While no single factor outweighs another, there are four cornerstones among initiatives that were new during the decade: realignment with the College's historic mission as a college of the United Methodist Church; NCAA-Division III athletic programs, which West describes as the "gold standard" in college athletics; growth in academic programs; and expansion of evening programs for adult learners. Huntingdon's tradition as a college where students can "know and be known" also remains an attractive alternative in the higher ed marketplace.

West, an ordained elder and a member of the Alabama-West Florida Conference of The United Methodist Church, made a focused reconnection with the College's historic Methodist roots when he took office in 2003. Majors in the liberal arts and especially in religion and Christian ministries blossomed from those roots, and Huntingdon has sent graduates each year to seminary and graduate schools for study in religion.

NCAA-Division III athletics—a conference in which student-athletes may not receive

athletic scholarships but play, instead, for the love of the game—has brought student-athletes to play and to cheer for new teams in football, women's and men's lacrosse, women's golf, and men's tennis, all established during the 2002–2012 decade. Likewise, new academic programs in physical education and sport management provide avenues for students who are interested in careers in sport science. Huntingdon announced in November 2013 the addition of men's wrestling to the College's intercollegiate teams—the only four-year college in the state to offer the sport. The first group of wrestlers arrived in fall 2014.

Football also served as the catalyst for the formation of a marching band, the Marching Scarlet and Grey, which attracted students who love music and who simultaneously have filled the classrooms in a variety of majors, in addition to majors reborn, by popular demand, in music and music education. The marching band added a Color Guard and a pom squad. Scores of musicians have recomposed the Concert Choir and built Huntingdon Harmony jazz/show choir, Huntingdon Winds symphonic band, Huntingdon Jazz, Huntingdon Community Pops ensemble, BallHawks Pep Band, and various vocal and instrumental ensembles. A concentration in worship leadership within the music major provides new career opportunities for musicians who wish to serve the church either vocationally or as an avocation.

The introduction or re-introduction of majors in accounting, elementary education (now combined with teacher preparation in collaborative special education), and digital art; and secondary teacher education in biology have also given students new options academically and vocationally. Secondary teacher education areas of preparation in general social studies and general science began in fall 2014.

"A great deal of our student growth can be attributed to word-of-mouth recruitment—students who are happy and then tell their friends and their brothers and sisters and cousins," said West. "For this reason, I credit greatly expanded student life and academic programming, from establishing the first ever Collegiate Exchange Club in the United States, to academic innovations like our student chapter of the American Chemical Society and our student chapter of the Alabama Association of School Curriculum and Development—the only one of its kind in the state—to growth and enthusiastic leadership in the Black Student Union and the Women's Center. Our faculty will tell you that what they love to do most is to teach and to mentor students, and they



have found ways to do so both inside and outside the classroom." The College's Center for Career and Vocation, Staton Center for Learning Enrichment, the Hawks on the Hill Internship Program, and the Hobbs Honors Program, all of which were created in the past decade, have also reinforced students' academic experiences and vocational discernment.

Huntingdon's facilities have been renovated or reconstructed in response to the demands of the growing student body, and that, in turn, has attracted more students. West cited many construction projects that have been completed during the last 10 years, with some of the most influential including the construction of W. James Samford Jr. Stadium; a major addition to the Colleae's science building. Bellingrath Hall:

the complete reconstruction of the tennis facilities and of both gymnasiums; sweeping enhancements to the dining hall; and \$1-million projects including Ligon Hall's renovation as a residence for freshman women and the construction of Leo J. Drum Jr. Theater.

While the representation of states among the Huntingdon full-time day enrollment has nearly doubled during the past decade, the main growth in enrollment occurred among students from Alabama. West credits expanded scholarship and financial assistance programs such as the Cross and Flame Award for Methodist students; the River Region Award for students from the tricounty area; and collaborative partnerships with major employers in the area for some of the growth in the traditional day program.

Also contributing to the growth of students from Alabama has been the expansion of the College's evening degree completion program, the Evening Bachelor's Degree (EBD). EBD, formerly known as the Adult Degree Completion Program, grew nearly ten-fold, from 28 students in fall 2002 to 253 students in fall 2012. The program is offered in 14 sites around the state and allows returning learners to complete their degrees by attending class just one night a week in five-week terms. Majors in business management and criminal justice are offered. Unlike other colleges cited for enrollment growth in the Chronicle's study, Huntingdon offers only limited online courses because of a core belief in the importance of the classroom experience.

And then there are the other lists

The Chronicle's list isn't the only one Huntingdon made in fall 2014. As has been the case for many years, the College ranks in the top tier of "Best Regional Colleges—South," by U.S. News and World Report and is listed among "America's Best Colleges—Region by Region (Southeast)," by the Princeton Review. Huntingdon has for four years been recognized on the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll. Washington Monthly, which ranks colleges on the basis of their contributions to the public good, places Huntingdon in the top 15% of 346 baccalaureate colleges.

From the "all publicity is good publicity" file, the Red Lady's reputation has become legend far beyond her regional haunts. Just in time for Halloween 2014 Martha made an appearance in two top lists. Online Schools Center hung Huntingdon at the number 11 spot among the "50 Most Haunted Colleges and Campuses," and Martha appeared at number 8 on Mental Floss magazine's "15 Tales of Female Ghosts."

Huntingdon becomes smoke-free

Huntingdon began the fall semester 2014 as a smoke-free campus, an initiative that started with a bill passed by the College's Student Government Association in the spring. The bill was signed into policy by President West in April. The "HC is Smoke-Free" initiative became effective August 1 and includes all forms of smoking tobacco:

cigarettes, cigars, pipes, hookahs, and e-cigarettes; and all Collegeowned properties, including offcampus housing.

In placing their bill for consideration, SGA members cited the Centers for Disease Control statement that smoking is the leading preventable cause of death in the United States, killing 443,000 people annually. Moreover, second-hand smoke, according to the CDC, causes an estimated 42,000 deaths from heart disease and 3,400 lung cancer deaths among non-smokers in America annually. Recently, many colleges and universities, including Auburn University, Troy University, and the University of Mississippi, have declared their campuses "smoke-free."

Construction and transformation underway

Lowder Construction has begun to build apartments on the property that once was the west wing of the Cloverdale School building, which they have owned since soon after

Collegiate wrestling practice facilities and offices will be accommodated in the former Cloverdale School cafeteria building.

Huntingdon purchased the school and its grounds in 2002. Meanwhile, the building that once housed the Cloverdale School's cafeteria is being transformed to house the College's new wrestling program and a new Pro Impact sports medicine and physical therapy clinic. The front plaza area of Smith Music Building will be the first piece of transformation in improvements planned for that building; updates are underway. Construction concluded in Miriam Jackson Home as fall classes began, accommodating the new Phyllis Gunter Snyder Center for Campus Ministries on the first floor.

Tree Campus USA Initiative Begins

With the celebration of Arbor Day 2014, Huntingdon announced the beginning of the Tree Campus USA initiative by giving away 150 seedlings furnished by the Alabama Forestry Commission. The initiative requires the formation of an advisory committee, and the group is planning a tree inventory, budget assessments and allocations, and service-learning initiatives as part of the qualification process.

The Tree Campus USA initiative fits naturally with Huntingdon's commitment to increase the number and variety of trees on campus and to maintain tree health. Students will learn through their participation in planting, caring for, and charting the growth and health of the trees, while Huntingdon will benefit from the trees' beauty, which simultaneously promote community sustainability through the reduction of carbon dioxide.

Service learning is one of the qualifications for Tree Campus USA recognition and is one of the reasons why President West is enthusiastic about the project. "We are thrilled that this project provides strong educational and environmental emphases, while also promoting two hallmarks for which Huntingdon is known—our beautiful campus and our commitment to community service," said West.

Huntingdon has lost nearly 100 trees during the past two decades because of severe weather, disease, and age, but has steadily restored the tree population. The College is participating in a project to restore American chestnut tree populations in the Southeast through the American Chestnut Foundation. Conversely, some trees on campus predate even the longest-serving employees, such as the state champion bur oak that lives in front of Bellingrath Hall, the College's science building.

Huntingdon and SUSCC sign reverse transfer agreement



President West and Southern Union State Community College President Glenda Colagross signed a "reverse transfer" agreement between the respective institutions in September 2014. The agreement allows SUSCC students who transfer to Huntingdon, whether in the traditional day program or the Evening Bachelor's Degree program, to transfer credits back to SUSCC toward completion of the associate's degree. The agreement is beneficial to transfer students and to both colleges, as well as to local workforce development.

"I'm very pleased that we could formalize this agreement today," said West. "When students transfer from two-year to four-year colleges before completing their associate's degrees, there is often a sense that the student has left something unfinished. A reverse transfer agreement contributes to the student's credentials and allows him or her to proceed along the educational pathway without waiting to finish the associate's degree, while providing closure to the sending institution, as well. The agreement will benefit the students who transfer to Huntingdon in our traditional day program as well as those in our Evening Bachelor's Degree program." One of Huntingdon's 14 satellite sites for the College's Evening Bachelor's Degree program is located on the SUSCC campus in Opelika. Other sites are in Bay Minette, Birmingham, Brewton, Center Point, Clanton, Daphne, Enterprise, Gadsden, Montgomery, Opelika, Pell City, Rainsville, Shelby and Sumiton.

Huntingdon Ability Sport Network Earns Second Year of Funding

The Huntingdon College Ability Sport Network (HC-ASN) tipped off its fall season in August 2014 with Red Wings Basketball, a wheelchair basketball team for children ages 6–21. HC-ASN was formed in 2013 and provides afterschool individual and team sports for children who are not able to participate on school teams because of physical impairments.

Alabama was the first state to address the Office of Civil Rights mandate to provide funding for after-school programs for children with disabilities. Huntingdon's Ability Sport Network received a grant last year from the Alabama Commission on Higher Education (ACHE) for developing teams in wheelchair basketball, wheelchair tennis, and wheelchair track and field and for training and equipping educators to work with this underserved population. ACHE recently approved a grant to continue funding for ASN for a second year.

Developed by **Dr. Lisa Olenik Dorman**, dean of the College's School of Teacher Education and Sport Science, the program's goal for young athletes is to teach prerequisite sport skills that will allow the youth to continue lifelong participation in organized sport or physical activities. The intent is that, through participation in activities such as wheelchair basketball and wheelchair tennis, participants will develop the confidence, work ethic, and leadership skills learned through team sports. The after-school

programs are open to students from any public or private school in the area whose physical impairments preclude them from participation in organized school-sponsored sports, but whose cognitive abilities allow them to master the necessary skills. Youth may enroll at any time—the program is free.

To date, the Huntingdon Ability Sport Network has offered Certified Disability Sport Specialist training through Blaze Sports America for two groups of educators. Workshop participants have been professionals—coaches, volunteers, teachers, and others—who work with individuals who have physical impairments. CDSS certification signifies the ability to provide safe, effective disability sport programming and knowledge of the latest research in the field, and establishes these professionals as leaders in disability sport.

THE SOLESIES

Wrestling

The first-year Huntingdon wrestling program began competition in November 2014 with 21 wrestlers. The Hawks, under head coach **Tom Storey**, are scheduled to compete in 10 events during their first season. With the addition of wrestling Huntingdon



has 15 varsity athletic programs. Huntingdon is the only four-year college in Alabama to offer wrestling as a competitive varsity sport.

Football



The Huntingdon football team wrapped up its second season in the USA South Athletic Conference with a 7-3 overall record and 6-2 Conference record. The Hawks finished tied for second in Conference standings and were the only Conference team to beat eventual USAS champion Christopher Newport. Huntingdon again featured one of the top offenses in Division

III, scoring 373 points and averaging 476.6 yards per game. Defensively, senior linebacker **Zach Brownell** was among the national Division III leaders with 12.4 tackles per game. Brownell was named first team All-Conference and was the USA South Defensive Player of the Year. Seven Hawks earned All-Conference honors. Joining Brownell on the first-team were offensive lineman **Chael Pridgen** and defensive backs **Jeremy Murphy** and **Anthony White**. Offensive lineman **Davian Barnett**, H-Back **Darius Dawsey**, and linebacker **Jacob Wright** were named second-team All-Conference. This was the seventh straight winning season for Huntingdon and the ninth winning record in 11 seasons under head coach **Mike Turk**.

Volleyball

The Huntingdon volleyball team battled inexperience and injuries and struggled to a 7-26 record during fall 2014. With 14 freshmen and sophomores and six juniors returning, the Lady Hawks hope to show improvement next season.



Soccer

The Huntingdon men's and women's soccer teams completed their second season in the USA South Athletic Conference in fall 2014. The men's team battled until the final game of the season but just missed a berth in the Conference tournament. The Hawks played in seven overtime games—including five double overtime games—and finished with a 2-10-5 record under second-year head coach **Matt Williams**. The Lady Hawks finished with a 2-17 record, but doubled their number of goals scored from the previous season.



With 10 freshmen, four sophomores, and three juniors returning, the Lady Hawks will look to improve next season.

Basketball



The Huntingdon men's basketball team finished strong in its first season in the USA South Athletic Conference, overcoming a 1-11 start to win 11 of their final 15 games and reach the USA South tournament championship game. Senior Austin Hill was named first-team All-Conference and **Jerome** Davis was named thirdteam All-Conference. Davis, Alex Layson, Terry Moorer, Cody Tackett, and Jason Varney were named to the Academic All-Conference team. Varney also turned in

a season highlight with 36 points against LaGrange in the regular season. The 36 points were the second most by a Hawk during the NCAA era. The women's basketball team missed out on the Conference tournament but posted a 15-10 record. Junior **Pat Pickens** powered the women's team and earned second-team All-Conference honors. She tied or broke the program's single-game scoring record three times and set the Lady Hawks' single-season scoring record with 424 points. Entering her senior season, she is the program's third all-time leading scorer during the NCAA era with 976 points. Pickens, Arbanee Dean, Jenna Dorman, Mackenzie Garmany, Kali Martin, Alyssa McCurry, and Jello Weatherspoon were named to the Academic All-Conference team.

Baseball



The Huntingdon baseball team entered the season with a young and inexperienced starting lineup, but the Hawks put together a 21-win season, finishing third in the USA South Athletic Conference standings and placing four players on the All-Conference team. Freshman Will Pharis was named USA South Rookie of the Year and outfielder Trammell DeJarnett was named first-team All-Con-

ference. Pharis, a third baseman, pitcher Gavin Free, and second baseman Jordan Freeman were each named second-team All-Conference. DeJarnett, Pharis, Marks Abernathy, Clark Berry, Josh Childers, Jordan Criswell, Dalton Dalrymple, Hunter Dreaden, Tate Fowler, J. Gardiner, Matt Gatewood, Blair Gornto, Jarrett Hall, Trey Hawker, Grant Hayes, Josh Hines, Patrick Kucera, Mitchell Luckie, Zach McGrady, Wes Nail, Philip Neal, Michael Rodda, Landon Sessions, Victor Taylor, and Brandon Veach were named to the Academic All-Conference team.

Softball

The Huntingdon softball team won 25 games and advanced to the Conference championship game in its first season as a member of the USA South Athletic Conference. The Lady Hawks fell to Piedmont College in the tournament finals to finish the season with a 25-15 overall record and a 17-5 Conference record. Counting the final three seasons in the Great South Athletic Conference, this was the fourth straight segson Huntingdon has played in a conference championship game. Designated

For the Lady Hawks, **Britni Thibodeau** and **Hannah Still** were named second-team All-Conference, and **Daniela Lozano** was a third-team selection. Thibodeau, Lozano, **Arielle Barraca**, **Zac Baldwin**, **Tyler Chaffee**, **Tyler Creamer**, **Justin McQueen**, and **Meyer Schwartzberg** were named to the Academic All-Conference team.

Golf



The Huntingdon women's golf team turned in its best performance in six seasons of competition, and the men's team continued to make steady progress. The Lady Hawks shot the best round in program history during the fall season and turned in three third-place finishes during the spring season. Saem Hur and Courtney Harville were named Academic All-Americans. Hur, Harville, LeeAnn Cahoon, Sydney Robbins, and Shay Roberson were named Academic All-Conference by the USA South. On the men's side, the Hawks finished fourth in the USA South Athletic Conference tournament. Rodes Bowers, Griffin Just, Jamey Lester, and Steven Smith were named Academic All-Americans. Bowers, Just, Lester, Justin Nolen, and Smith were named to the 2014 Academic All-Conference team.

Lacrosse

The Huntingdon lacrosse teams continued to raise the bar during the 2014 season. The third-year men's lacrosse team put together its first winning season and its first 10-win season. The Hawks (10-6) won five games during their first season and seven games during their second season. The Lady Hawks were 7-9 and advanced to the USA South Athletic Conference tournament in their first season in the Conference. The Lady Hawks are 15-15 after two seasons of competition. 

Ms. Helen Norris Bell


"Classy." "erudite." "slyly funny." "dedicated," "incisive," "delightful," "a wonderful teacher," "a brilliant writer," "an amazing human being" ... these are just a few of the words used by former students and fellow writers to describe Helen Norris Bell, professor of English emerita, who died at age 97 November 18, 2013, in Black Mountain, N.C. Ms. Bell earned bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Alabama and completed work toward a doctorate at Duke University. She began teachina at Huntinadon in 1966 and was honored with emerita status in 1980. An accomplished writer, Ms. Bell's published novels included Something More Than Earth, 1940; For the Glory of God, 1958; More Than Seven Watchmen, 1985; and A Walk with



the Sickle Moon, 1985; but she was best known for works of shorter fiction, including four collections of short stories (The Christmas Wife, 1985; Water Into Wine, 1988; The Burning Glass, 1992; and One Day in the Life of a Born Again Loser and Other Stories, 2000) and two volumes of poetry. She was a finalist for the PEN/Faulkner Award and the Los Angeles Times Fiction Award and received five O'Henry Awards, a Pushcart Prize, two Andrew Lytle Awards, and a Hackney Short Story Award. Two of her stories were adapted into movies, "The Christmas Wife," by HBO in 1988, and "The Cracker Man" by PBS in 1999, the same year she was commissioned by Governor Don Siegelman to serve as Alabama's sixth Poet Laureate. Her stories have been translated into Chinese, Polish, Dutch, and Tamil.

Mr. Dave Morris

Dave Morris, who served as director of development for Huntingdon from 1973 to 1993, died December 7, 2013, at his home in Montgomery. He was 83. Dr. Morris earned bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Florida and later earned the Master of Religious Education from Southwest Baptist Seminary and the Doctor of Education from the University of Alabama. He served as director of public relations for Mississippi College and for the Alabama Baptist State Executive Board before coming to Huntingdon. He received national honors for his writing and production of an original TV ad series, "Mainstream."



Dr. Harald Rohlig



Huntingdon faculty, staff, former students, and friends and musicians from around Montgomery said goodbye to legendary Huntingdon professor of music emeritus **Dr. Harald Rohlig** October 31, 2014. He died October 25 at age 88 after a long illness.

Dr. Rohlig was a fixture of Huntingdon music from 1955 until his retirement in 2006. His longevity at Huntingdon meant that grandparents and grand-children could compare stories about his classes.

Nearly concurrently, he served as director of music for St. John's Episcopal Church in downtown Montgomery, while writing more than a thousand compositions for organ and for choir. Harald Rohlig's music legend spanned worldwide, not just because of his bi-continental homelands, but also because his compositions be-

came standard organist repertoire and his skills at designing organs were rare, exemplary and sought after. He designed Huntingdon's Bellingrath Memorial Organ, installed in 1965 and expanded to nearly double its original size in 2000. He once said, "My organs are like my children, and I have them all over the country."

Dr. Rohlig cared little about whether his music compositions were published, because he often said that he wrote and played for the glory of God. Beyond that, he said, "Let the chips fall where they may."

He peppered his music lessons and liberal arts classes, such as his signature course, Music and the Christian Faith, with wisdom gained through life lessons few could replicate. Dr. Rohlig's stories mesmerized students: tales of his childhood in Germany during Hitler's rise to power; as a child musical prodigy, playing piano and violin at an early gae; as the son of a United Methodist minister, his father stolen away by German officers in the middle of the night for preaching that his parishioners should follow God and not Hitler; as a member of the Hitler Youth, pressured to join after much protest by the family and intimidation by leaders of the Hitler regime; as a member of the German army; as a hostage captured by the Americans and traded for a load of coal to the French; as a prisoner in a French work camp forced to search for and to detonate unexploded bombs in the fields; as a gifted organist whisked from the camp once a week to play for the general's church, where the priest would hide a sandwich in the piano seat for the starving prisoner; as a prisoner among a group marched out to be executed, who joined with his fellow captives in song as the guns were lowered, only to see his executors lay down their guns and walk away; as a young man liberated at 98 pounds in 1948, three years after the end of the war, with a shattered bone in his right hand from an exploded bomb and with a dream to return to his beloved music.

He completed his music education at Osnabruck Academy in Germany and studied at the Royal Academy of Music in London. In 1953, a few days after marrying his first wife, Ingeborg, a violinist he met at Osnabruck, the couple moved to tiny Linden, Alabama, where he served as music minister for First United Methodist Church. Two years later he came to Huntingdon.

Six years after Ingeborg's death in 1999, Dr. Rohlig became reacquainted with his former student, **Jeanette Lynn '65**. They married in 2005, and she became his devoted caregiver during the last few years of his life. Dr. Rohlig retired from Huntingdon in 2006 but continued to teach organ privately until 2012, touching thousands of lives with his gifts for sharing wisdom and music throughout a storied lifetime



Dr. James Glass

During Homecoming 2014, Huntingdon Concert Choir and more than two dozen alumni remembered the life and musical legacy of Dr. James Glass, professor emeritus of music, who died January 27, 2014, from complications of Parkinson's disease. Dr. Glass came to Huntingdon as an associate professor of music in 1989 and retired in 2007, serving as a chair of the Department of Music during his tenure. He earned degrees in vocal performance and musicology from Hardin-Simmons University, Southwestern Seminary, and the University of Texas. His varied career included performing in opera, oratoria, and concert and serving as a choral conductor and adjudicator, but he was best known as an outstanding teacher of voice. At Huntingdon he



directed the madrigal program and various operatic performances, as well as the Concert Choir, other vocal ensembles, and numerous travel-study trips in Europe. He served on the board of the National Association of Teachers of Singing and as an officer in the American Choral Directors Association. Dr. Glass' students were consistent winners in vocal contests throughout the Southeast, and many of his students pursued careers as performers and teachers. "Dr. James Glass was a champion for music excellence, a dedicated teacher, and a committed advocate for his students," said Huntingdon President J. Cameron West. "His good work furthered Huntingdon's reputation for providing musical opportunities of the highest caliber not only for Huntingdon students, but also for the community. His memory and influence live on in our music programs and in those who had the privilege of knowing and studying with him."




