PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



When President John Massey recommended the College's move from Tuskegee to Montgomery in 1908, he wrote these words:

"The [Civil War] completely changed the status of plantation life. Railroads brought about new and rapid modes of travel, built up new centers of population, and concentrated business in points favorable to trade. The whole commercial condition of the State had undergone a marvelous transformation; and the educational conditions had also changed, if possible, more than the material."

Dr. Massey, who had served as president since 1876, knew that a college's roots for growth can only begin where it's planted. His vision uprooted the campus and moved it to the capital in order that the College and the city could thrive. A handful of Montgomery businessmen—all Methodists who recognized what a college in the neighborhood could do

for the city—made the move possible by securing the land, 50 acres once part of a cotton farm, for \$100 per acre.

That's how Huntingdon's Montgomery heritage began—with faith, hope, wisdom, and soil. Through these 106 years in the College's Montgomery home, the exchanges of knowledge, financial and human resources, helping hands, internships and jobs, leadership and involvement have forged friendships, careers, and legacies. Indeed, this partnership has forged the College's and the city's history and future.

This issue celebrates the educational exchange that has flourished in this soil. May Town and Gown always prosper together!

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HUNTINGDON AND THE COMMUNITY: WHERE HANDS AND MINDS MEET

Huntingdon has never taken a "college-on-the-hill" approach. Tight as a firm handshake, the College's roots and actions are deeply community-based.

It's an In-Service Friday, which means students have no classes but College offices are open. Community service director **Patrick Reynolds** shows no mercy for a day of leisure. He's compelled a group of Hawks to be out of bed and getting their feathers dirty as part of the Tree Campus USA Initiative. Today, they're tending to the oak trees planted several years ago along Fairview Avenue by the City of Montgomery as part

of a community beautification project. Students are reinforcing the trunks, mulching the bases, feeding, and watering. In doing so, the trees' purpose extends beyond beauty—they give life to students' understanding of the College motto and of their civic responsibility.

While no college is an island, Huntingdon's roots in the River Region are deep and strong. Just like the trees, the College and community trade vital, life-giving benefits and resources.

On this In-Service Day, **Kati Perdue Williams** '16 is out of bed before dawn, ready to meet her students at Bear Exploration Center. A pre-service teacher candidate, she's putting the exclamation point on her four years at Huntingdon and beginning what could be a long career of influencing and enhancing children's lives and learning. Kati is just one of about 20 students who graduate with degrees and intentions to teach each year. (Among those in the Class of 2015, all found teaching placements by fall semester.)

One such graduate, **Sarah Fell '15**, was hired for the coveted music teacher role at Bear. During the year she will work with students in each elementary grade to produce a musical of their own. In October 2015, she and the third graders presented the play, "Mighty Minds." At least three of Fell's third graders are children of Huntingdon faculty and staff. In that special way, the circle of involvement and influence creates a butterfly effect from Huntingdon to the community and back again.

"Huntingdon has graduated hundreds of teachers who carry the Huntingdon motto and values of faith, wisdom, and service with them as they move forward," says **Dr. Suzanne Snow**, chair of the Department of Teacher Education. "Through faith, teachers

give of themselves to help students reach their full potential. Through wisdom, teachers use comprehension, foresight, common sense, good judgment, and understanding of the task at hand to make a difference with each student or parent. Service, for a teacher, is a calling that goes well beyond a time-clock."

Downtown on this Friday, Montgomery Symphony Orchestra executive director Kim Cauthen Wolfe '09 plans for the spring 2016 Vann Vocal Institute, which will be conducted at Huntingdon for the eighth time. High school and college singers from the South will audition for precious time in a master class with world-renowned opera great David Cangelosi or another Vann Vocal instructor. Cangelosi serves as creative director for the Institute, to which he brings several opera friends each year. Together, they offer a public celebrity recital at the beginning of their three days on campus. At the program's conclusion, star students are selected to perform in the Emergina Artists recital. Both concerts and the Cangelosi master classes are free and open to the public.

With the exception of the annual Clover-Jam concerts, nearly all Huntingdon lectures, concerts, and performances are free and open to the public. During the 2014–15 academic year the public enjoyed, at the cost of only the transportation to and from campus, guest speakers such as novelist, journalist, humanitarian, and Stallworth lecturer Masha Hamilton; Martin Luther King Jr. Convocation preacher the Rev. Lisa Yebuah; Elizabeth Belcher Cheek Concert artists Vadim Serebryany and the American String Quartet; writer and Rhoda Coleman Ellison lecturer Jennifer Horne; Community Concert Series artist Jeremy Samolesky; Faculty Recital Series performers Rusty Logan and Marie Robertson; author and Chapman Benson lecturer Dr. Ellen Davis; and performances by the concert choir, Huntingdon Jazz, Huntingdon Harmony, Huntingdon Pops, Huntingdon Winds, and various faculty and student recitals. Huntingdon's community and cultural events are sponsored by Baptist Health.

"I believe it is Huntingdon's privilege to provide community enrichment in addition to an outstanding liberal arts education for our students," says Huntingdon **President J. Cameron West.** "We offer these educational and fine arts programs at no cost to

facilitate accessibility for anyone who has the desire to learn and to enjoy. We appreciate Baptist Health's sponsorship in bringing so many exciting speakers and performers to Huntingdon."

Joggers, bikers, stroller-pushers, and dogwalkers who think of the Huntingdon campus as a welcoming park are making their way through the sun-filtering trees and toward the Green. In a couple of weeks the sidewalks will be covered with Homecoming chalk drawings, and bright colors and booming sounds will back-light the steeple during Homecoming fireworks. Families—some whose only connection to the campus is proximity—will spread blankets on the Green to enjoy the show.

Any given week, Huntingdon's campus holds and hosts a web of community activities. Civic groups, YMCA sports teams, churches, home schoolers, and area schools use the fields, gyms, chapel, courts, theater, and classrooms in events from science fairs to student government debates to basketball tournaments. SaveFirst trains Huntingdon interns and offers free on-campus tax preparation services for low-income families; a partnership with Emory University allows Huntingdon to offer Course of Study continuing education and degree completion for lay ministers; and a partnership with Pro-Impact Sports Medicine provides athletic training and physical therapy for Huntingdon student-athletes as well as client services for the community—and these are just a few examples.

A new Homecoming tradition, children and neighbors enjoy the booming fireworks celebration as much as the campus community does.



Summers bustle by with nearly the same level of activity, though the audience differs. Sport, cheer, spirit, band, church, and Stringfellows camps make the campus home, and nearly every weekend brings weddings to the chapel.

Last summer Huntingdon's pilot program, the Huntingdon Leadership Academy, brought to campus 35 youth recognized by their home congregation ministers as future Christian leaders. The students participated in a two-day seminar, learning from Huntingdon religion faculty and local clergy about the skills considered essential for leadership in ministry vocations and in lay ministry. Huntingdon Chaplain Woods Lisenby '11 captained the project, to which churches contributed 50 percent per participant. "We wanted churches to consider fully the gifts and resources of each student they sponsored," says Lisenby, "and to have a stake in the impact of a program that offers support for those gifts."

This In-Service Friday, buses have been loaded with the football team, cheerleaders, and the Marching Scarlet and Grey, who are awaiting departure for an away game. If this were a regular fall Friday, these students and staff would be readying their skills, equipment, and instruments for an all-feet-on-the-field home game. By Saturday,

scarlet and grey balloons, tents, grills, and signs would shout the excitement as Cloverdale "puts its Hawk on."

Game days are community days. Come game time, neighbors will pull their field chairs up to the fence-line and set up watching posts on the balconies of the condos that face the field. Some will join in the tailgating. Some will just watch and cheer. At only \$10 per ticket or \$5 for children, no other college football program around can provide such affordable entertainment for the whole family—complete with Hank the Hawk and scores of rousing band music. Stand capacity is 2,500 seats, but hundreds more enjoy game day-long fun.

At a nearby YMCA on this In-Service day, Huntingdon lacrosse players and coaches are discussing the best ways to reach and rally community youth for the teams they have initiated across the region. This fall, head coaches **Andrew Carey** and **Julia Steier** and their teams have introduced the sport to area youth, and so far 60 boys and 15 girls have picked up sticks. Hawks lacrosse players are mentors and encouragers for the youth.

The students who are tending the trees—as well as the lacrosse teams—are among hundreds who have already accumulated community service hours during the fall semester. By mid-term of the fall 2015 semester, more than 1,300 individual community service hours had been reported, not counting the traditional Big Red Day of Service, when more than 300 students contributed more than 1,000 hours of service in 13 locations across the city. Students raise money and walk, run, and ride bikes (or wheelchairs) for local causes. They contribute time and energy at local farms, homeless and domestic

shelters, schools, churches, museums, senior centers, parks, MANE, the Montgomery Zoo, and so many more establishments, making a difference in the lives of others.

Three Huntingdon initiatives based in the School of Teacher Education and Sport Science have brought joy to segments of the community who are often ignored. The Ability Sport Network, beginning its third year in fall 2015, offers after-school sports for youth ages 6-21 who require adapted measures for participation. The program has formed wheelchair teams, the Red Wings, in tennis, basketball, and boccia. The Red Wings practice for competition with wheelchair teams from other areas and invite students from the community to compete with them on Inclusive Sport Saturdays. ASN also trains area educators and coaches as a first step toward completion of the Certified Disability Sport Specialist credential so that more differently-abled students will be well-served.

In a new agreement with area Title I schools, Huntingdon's Kingswood Initiative will place the College's pre-service teacher candidates in area schools that have high populations of economically disadvantaged students, in addition to other placements. The initiative is meant to "teach up" by encouraging elementary students toward high school completion and college, while simultaneously equipping pre-service teacher candidates with more comprehensive community experience.

A third initiative, the Adapted Physical Education program, serves special needs students from two area elementary schools this year.

More than four dozen Huntingdon students intern in the community—some for pay and some not—each semester. The students not only contribute what they have learned in the classroom, but also perfect their knowledge, skills, and talents to become more productive students and employees in the future.

Julia Shappert '17, a former Distinguished Young Woman from Ohio and the 2014 Miss Huntingdon, held two internships during the 2015 fall semester: one at an accounting firm and one for the Montgomery Chamber of Commerce.

"Interning is honestly one of my favorite college experiences because I get to put into practice skills and concepts that I've only really heard about in the classroom," says Shappert. "As a business administration major, I find it vital to understand how management and marketing work. ... I know that the skills and relationships I build from these internships will prepare me well for full-time employment after graduation."

On the economic side, students purchase food, groceries, gas, supplies, clothing, and entertainment in River Region businesses. They work in part-time jobs in all of these industries and in non-profit organizations. Thousands of graduates have entered professions across a vast spectrum of career fields. Huntingdon alumni learn and emulate the motto reinforced daily at Huntingdon: "Enter to grow in wisdom; go forth to apply wisdom in service," and continue to serve in their communities in addition to their paid work.

Just like air and water, the community is as vital a resource for the College as the College is for the community, says West, who serves on the board of directors of the Montgomery Area Business Committee for the Arts, chairs the board of trustees of the Alabama Independent Colleges and Universities, is chair-elect of the USA South Athletic Conference President's Council, and is a member of the Duke Divinity School Board of Visitors. "The community is better because Huntingdon serves, and whatever we do to better the community also betters our campus."

It's the questions that matter most in an educational setting.

In the asking and the figuring out—the research, discussion, reading, and wondering—students seek their own connections, find their own facts, and embrace truths that are deeply considered and personally owned.

Still better, when learning involves doing, all of the student's senses engage and inform.

Knowledge is not an object to be handed from one to another or absorbed like water, says Huntingdon professor of religion **Dr.**Jason Borders. "I don't think of students as sponges, as if knowledge is a thing to be absorbed. Knowledge isn't static, it happens."

Involved inquiry has become part of some of the most traditionally book-and-lecture-centered courses at Huntingdon, and the result is 21st century thinkers who can assimilate more readily into the professional realm. After all, they already understand some of knowledge's practical applications.

To develop his spring 2015 course, Justice, Nonviolence, and Luke's Gospel, Borders asked students what they wanted to know more about, then designed the course to match their wonderings. "Most of us have little to no understanding of what nonviolence means in Christianity," says Borders. "We have peace unless or until war is necessary. So if nonviolence is an alternative, really, what does it look like? How does it work? Who's doing it?"

In order to give students "real dialogue with the world," Borders arranged for class members to speak either in person or via Skype with an impressive mix of leaders who are working in ministries and vocations of peace and justice around the world, including the Rev. Lisa Yebuah, pastor of inviting ministries at Edenton Street United Methodist Church in Raleigh, N.C., who was in town to speak for the College's Martin Luther King Jr. Convocation; five members of the Wesley College steering committee in Tanzania; Shane Claiborne, an activist, author, and founding member of the Simple Way in Philadelphia, Penn.; and Dr. Ellen Marshall, associate pro-

fessor of Christian ethics and conflict transformation at Candler School of Theology, Emory University. The class also visited the Equal Justice Initiative, founded by Bryan Stevenson in downtown Montgomery. Borders created a closed Facebook group where members of the class could "challenge and encourage one another around issues and ideas we encountered."

This face-to-face immersion in the realities of the world, rather than in the theories of those realities, is made more possible because of new media innovations.

In a recent Christianity and Civil Rights course, Dr. Mandy McMichael asked students to create an interactive Google map of Montgomery's plethora of civil rights sites and to tweet about what they discovered. The project's purpose was to document places, people, and events beyond the famous ones captured in history books. "The assignment forced the students out into the community to talk with people," says McMichael. "It also encouraged them to take an active role in the learning process." Three students even met and interviewed Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s barber, Nelson Malden, taking in stories in a place where stories have been gifted from generation to generation.

While creating the map, students considered the questions: What constitutes civil rights? What institutions are continuing the fight for justice? What roles have Christians played in these struggles? How do we find our place in all of this?

Considering perspectives other than one's own is an essential component of developing strong critical thinking skills. During the 2015–16 academic year, classes from a wide range of subjects are exploring the Montgomery Museum of Fine Art's impressive collections, considering subjects from perspectives other than those represented in class. A math class may study Fibonacci numbers and explore a wall-sized mural based on the numerical sequences [the

mural was planned by part-time Huntingdon art instructor **Tara Sartorious**—see cover image]. Nearby, a basket woven by Huntingdon alumna and world famous basket artist **Billie Ruth Stewart Sudduth '67** demonstrates further the patterns that form when the numerical sequences are recreated. A biology class looks through the museum's print of a John James Audubon ornithological painting to compare and discuss habitat, adaption, migration, and evolution. A history class considers Thomas Hicks' 1867 portrait of George Washington and what it tells viewers about the country's first president.

"Observation is often underdeveloped in our culture," says Alice Novak, assistant cu-

rator of education at MMFA. "While we are inundated with images, we don't often stop to think about them or interpret them. Art animates our intellect ... it is useful in teaching any subject."

For nearly 20 years, Huntingdon has encouraged students to embark in the study of another culture by offering travel-study experiences within regular educational costs, where students may travel with groups of their peers, shepherded by Huntingdon faculty and staff. "Travel-study engages all of the senses," says veteran traveler and longtime French instructor Mme Camille Elebash-Hill. "Learning about a place requires immersing yourself in it—what you see, how it sounds and smells, the taste of the food. There is nothing like buying your bread in a 400-year-old bakery or the scent of wax and incense in a 1,000-year-old church. These are the memories that stay with you forever. There is no more eye-opening way for students to see the similarities of cultures, rather than what divides us." Other travelstudy experiences that require student monetary contributions have been offered as well.

Eric A. Kidwell, professor and director of Huntingdon's Houghton Library, and Dr. Maureen Kendrick Murphy '78, professor of chemistry, have co-led travel-study groups to Australia and Hawaii. To reinforce travelers' knowledge of the groups' destinations, each student chose a topic of interest and created a LibGuide—a list of resources such as books, articles, websites, blogs, films, plays, documentaries, and television shows—anything documentable and accessible using Huntingdon's library or a library in the destination country. One student researched gender issues for her Hawaii LibGuide; an Australia-bound student researched Aboriginal music; another, planning to attend medical school, chose

Aboriginal medicine as her topic; a prospective teacher studied the Australian science curriculum. "The purpose is not to list everything available through our library on a topic," says Kidwell, "but rather to get the researcher started down the right path. We want to show the variety of resources available on a topic and make students aware of aspects of a topic they might never have considered."

Kidwell and Murphy evaluated students' work based on a rubric and chose the best for publication on the library's website. Some students used their published Lib-Guides in support of their graduate school applications.

"A LibGuide allows a person to tap into her or his creativity, since the visual nature of the end product is integral to the guide's overall success in communicating information to the user," says Kidwell. Some students

continued working on their LibGuides even after the classes concluded.

The academic implications of the use of new media are of interest in the scholarly community as a whole. Borders spoke on the use of Skype in the Biblical Studies classroom for the Annual Meeting of the Society of Biblical Literature in November 2015; Kidwell has presented on the use of LibGuides for an international online conference; and McMichael is using her Google maps project assignment and her syllabus for the class as a focus of her fellowship with the Wabash Center (see page 16).

The importance of involved learning is most evident when students are preparing for careers that require working one-on-one with others. In the expanse of human uniqueness, how can one prepare for working with others unless one has done so before graduation? That's why pre-service teacher candidates intern in classrooms; prospective athletic trainers work with student-athletes; admission to medical school requires shadowing at least two physicians to watch their interaction with patients; students considering ministry intern with churches; and the accounting program has partnered with the SaveFirst Initiative to train students how to prepare free tax returns for low-income families.

Dr. Jared Rehm teaches the College's Adapted Physical Education course, which brings special needs students from Garrett and Wilson elementary schools to Huntingdon. The relationship is mutually beneficial. Huntingdon pre-service physical education teacher candidates earn time with and

understanding of special needs students, and special needs students get exercise, involvement with others, and valuable self-understanding of and practice using the most basic actions and gestures.

"The students we work with in APE have multiple learning differences and abilities," says Rehm. "Just as humans differ, so does learning. As Huntingdon students interact with these elementary students, they can test theories: How can I get this child to hit a ball? How can I get this child to pick up something and put it in a container? What will motivate this student to cooperate with others? Questions like this are essential for reaching and affecting learning in the students our own students will teach one day."

"Before I took this class, I had only read about teaching physical education in books," says **David Munroe** '17. "Now that I have the opportunity to work with children, I realize that everyone learns differently. Even the most basic gestures I take for granted are difficult or not understood by special needs students, in particular. Working with these children is like solving a puzzle, one piece at a time."

As Huntingdon students consider the questions, says Borders, possible solutions appear. "Students have to own the solutions," says Borders. "Students need opportunities to experience the social construction of knowledge, itself, and to be allowed to create solutions ... through a process of discovery and interaction. Instruction guides the learning process, but it cannot take the place of learning. Learning involves doing something."

For Borders' Justice and Nonviolence students, the questions and the process of finding answers informed students' thinking as well as their behaviors. "For our class, students were interested to know and to engage the specifically Christian contribution to the world's understanding of justice and nonviolence. In a manner of speaking, students were exploring ways to non-identically repeat Christ's life in the world," says Borders.

Lexie Ofe '17, who was a member of the class, wrote after its conclusion, "The books and articles we read were wonderful, and the people we met were awesome, but I am even more grateful that I could share this class with some of the most thoughtful and intelligent people I know. The best gift that came from this class was seeing us all be challenged by life-giving questions, but they can only be life-giving insofar as we let them change the way we treat each other and our own selves."

Faculty Spotlight: Dr. Jared Rehm

A decade ago **Dr. Jared Rehm** played wheelchair tennis and basketball as a youth in the College's Wheelin' Hawks program. Now with a doctorate in kinesiology and years of wheelchair sport experience—both as an athlete and a coach—Rehm returned to campus in fall 2015 to serve on the faculty in the College's School of Teacher Education and Sport Science.

Born with spina bifida, Rehm played stand-up sports until puberty increased others' speed too much for him to keep up. Not to be deterred, he discovered the Lakeshore Foundation's wheelchair tennis program and traveled to Birmingham to compete.

By the time Rehm graduated from high school, he had played for national and international teams in wheelchair tennis, including the Junior World Cup Team, with whom he traveled to New Zealand for competition during his senior year. The University of Wisconsin-Whitewater noticed his abilities and recruited him to play on their wheelchair basketball team, which won the national championship during Rehm's freshman year and came in as runners-up during his sophomore year.

Later, he transferred and became Auburn University's first wheelchair athlete, playing both tennis and basketball. He completed his bachelor's degree in philosophy and then stayed for graduate and doctoral degrees, during which he coordinated and coached for AU's adapted sport programs.

One of the Huntingdon classes Rehm teaches is the College's Adapted Physical Education partnership with the special education programs at Garrett and Wilson elementary schools in Montgomery. Four times each semester, Huntingdon APE students work on basic skill development with special needs children who are bused to the campus.

Rehm also assists in the direction of Huntingdon's Ability Sport Network, an after-school adapted sport program serving commu-






nity youth ages 6–21 who can't play with their school teams because of physical ability differences. The teams compete in wheelchair basketball, tennis, and boccia. "Sport offers the chance to accomplish something," says Rehm. "We, as people, have a drive to do—to accomplish. Sport also offers the chance to interconnect and to work in community with people to achieve. It breaks down barriers and puts student-athletes on a level playing field so that we stop focusing on the differences and focus, instead, on the person within the context of the sport."

Dr. Jeremy R.T. Lewis, professor of political science, gave the keynote address for the International Seminar on Governance and Public Policy held in June 2015 at St. Petersburg State University, Russia. Lewis and the convener, Prof. Leonid Smorgunov, are vice-chairs of research committee 48 on comparative administrative culture of the International Political Science Association (IPSA). In the address (viewable on YouTube), Dr. Lewis discusses trends in public administration: freedom of information laws, transparency, e-government, and public policy.



Huntingdon College senior and Montgomery native India Chaney '16 came home with more than memories from her first trip to Washington, D.C., in 2015. The biology major presented her research on the use of PLGA (poly-DL-glycolide) nanoparticles as anti-cancer delivery agents at the 2015 Emerging Researchers National Conference in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics. She came away with a first place award in the biomedical engineering category.



Dr. Kristine Copping, assistant professor of psychology, was voted by members of the junior and senior classes as the recipient of the Julia Lightfoot Sellers Award, given annually to "that member of the teaching faculty who has done much toward inspiring students to nobility of purpose and integrity of character, and rekindling within them a deeper desire for learning." She was presented the award during 2015 Commencement Exercises.



For the fourth consecutive year, Huntingdon College has been named to the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll. Inclusion on the list published by the Corporation for National and Community Service signifies the highest federal recognition colleges and universities can receive regarding community service, service-learning, and civic engagement.

The Cross and Flame Award is given to each full-time day student who is a member of a United Methodist congregation, who has been admitted on regular or honors status, and who is recommended by his or her pastor. "Huntingdon College is a model United Methodist institution of higher education, and the Cross and Flame Award has made a superior liberal arts education accessible to so many of our young people," said Huntingdon trustee and Alabama-West Florida Conference Bishop Paul Leeland. "I salute Huntingdon's intentional efforts to support the denomination's priority of preparing the next generation of leaders for the Church and for the world." For the 2016–17 academic year, the Cross and Flame Award is valued at \$11,500 per year.

Faculty Spotlight: Dr. Tom Perrin

The summer of 2015 was memorable for **Dr. Tom Perrin**, assistant professor of English, whose first book, The Aesthetics of Middlebrow Fiction: Popular US Novels, Modernism, and Form, 1945–75 (New York: Palgrave Macmillan), was published; and whose essay, "Harper Lee's Bad Form," published on LitHub, was selected Best of the Week for September 15, 2015.




The book, an extension of his doctoral dissertation, discusses novels written in the 20 years after World War II—popular but respectable fiction that took on serious ideas, explored cultural boundaries, and included messages on how life could be better lived. Although books such as The Harder They Fall, To Kill a Mockingbird, Exodus, Hawaii, Advise and Consent, and Gentleman's Agreement have pedagogical qualities to them, they were popularly received for their plot, suspense, and pageturner addictiveness, says Perrin.

Middlebrow fiction includes the epics and coming-of-age stories that uplifted the middle-class, who were searching for ways not to be discontented. As these novels were published, modern conveniences proliferated into middle-class households, the space race sent imaginations skyward, and the Book-of-the-Month Club made books convenient and accessible. "These popular, critically acclaimed novels that have, with the

exception of Mockingbird, largely been forgotten, are a major part of English literary history," says Perrin.

Perrin joined Huntingdon Department of Language and Literature faculty in 2011 after serving as a B.A. preceptor, lecturer, course assistant, and writing instructor at the University of Chicago, where he earned graduate and doctoral degrees. He completed undergraduate education and one graduate



degree at Cambridge University in the U.K., his home country.

His latest project is an exploration in book arts: handmade children's books. *Middlebrow* is available through Amazon.com.

Perrin has been appointed director of Huntingdon's Joyce and Truman Hobbs Honors Program beginning spring term 2016.



Huntingdon Wins National Service Learning Contest

Huntingdon College is a national champion, thanks to the collective votes garnered during a recent national service competition. In November 2015, the Arbor Day Foundation selected Huntingdon College as one of three national small college finalists in their Tree Campus USA Service Learning Contest, with the winner determined by online voting. Huntingdon and her supporters rallied for the cause and captured the prize: \$10,000 of funding to plant trees in the West Fairview area along South Holt Street. The results were announced November 18. Huntingdon's Tree Campus USA coordinator is Gabrielle Ehinger, instructor of biology, pictured above with Dr. Jim Daniels, associate professor of biology. Ehinger worked with Montgomery City Forester Russell Stringer to develop the proposal.

"Thank you to the Huntingdon community and to the College's larger community—families, alumni, friends, neighbors—who heard about the contest and helped with their votes," said Huntingdon College **President J. Cameron West.** "Hawks fly in wide circles, and this contest certainly proved that statement."

The area in which the trees will be planted is part of a municipal initiative that includes efforts to revitalize the community by beautifying and improving streetscapes for walkability, safety, and connectivity. The proposed project is .25 miles from the Selma-to-Montgomery National Historic Trail. Huntingdon students will help with planting and maintaining 40 trees near the recently completed Fairview Environmental Park, beginning in the spring of 2016. Stringer will oversee tree selection, planting, and maintenance.

"The most important aspects of this project are that it will improve the Montgomery community at the same time it allows Huntingdon students to act on the College motto, 'Enter to Grow in Wisdom, Go Forth to Apply Wisdom in Service,'" said West.

Huntingdon College earned Tree Campus USA status in 2014, a designation bestowed by the Arbor Day Foundation in recognition of a college or university's effective tree management, promotion of student involvement, and connectivity with the surrounding community through forestry efforts.

Faculty Spotlight: Dr. Mandy McMichael



Dr. Mandy McMichael, assistant professor of religion, was one of 14 non-tenured faculty members nationwide selected to participate in the 2015–16 Teaching and Learning Workshop for Pre-Tenure Religion Faculty at Colleges and Universities, conducted by the Wabash Center for Teaching and Learning in Theology and Religion. Her involvement requires participation in three separate workshops through June 2016. The purpose of the

workshops is to create a community of committed and skilled teachers who will explore together strategies for effective teaching; course design, assignments, and assessment; teaching in one's institutional context; diversity in the classroom; balancing competing life demands; and tenure preparation.

McMichael returned from her first workshop during summer 2015 describing the experience as "life-giving." "[Seminar faculty] know so much about teaching; they understand pedagogy," says McMichael. "They allowed us opportunities to interact and to learn from each other. They understand that productive time is not always structured time. ... I've never had someone treat my time as so precious."

McMichael says the workshop will benefit students and learning for all of the faculty members involved, as well. "If we care about teaching, our students are more likely to develop a lifelong love of learning," she says.

Although she first approached the workshop as if waiting for, in her words, "the golden nugget of pedagogical wisdom," she came away convinced firmly that there is not just one way to teach well. "There are multiple ways to be amazing. When you let teachers and students live into their gifts, that's when the magic happens."

She will complete her final two workshops in January and June 2016. Participants in this highly selective program receive stipends plus local and travel expenses for participation. The Wabash Center is part of Wabash College, Crawfordsville, Indiana.

Faculty Spotlight: Dr. Paul Gier

It's hot in Dauphin Island, Ala., in July. Gnats and flies swarm toward beaded sweat; pinchy crabs dwell in the sand beneath blankets and towels. Nearby, in the murky water off the island's shoreline, the life cycle of a fluke, a parasitic worm, is repeating itself continually.

No matter the conditions, **Dr. Paul Gier**, professor of biology, keeps a cool head. Three hours south of his home in Mont-



gomery, Ala., in the waters off of Mobile Bay, with 19 college students listening to his directions and questions, the process of discovery repeats itself from student to professor and back again. Summer 2015 was the first time Gier taught a Dauphin Island Sea Lab course. It won't be the last.

Dauphin Island Sea Lab is a consortial educational partnership among colleges and universities in Alabama, who each send faculty to provide oversight for the courses offered there. Gier has attended these meetings for years. To be selected as an instructor, however, is both prestigious and competitive.

Anyone from anywhere can enroll in the classes, but most of the students are Alabama college undergraduates. Two in Gier's course, Marine Behavioral Ecology, were Huntingdon students. If a student spends each of her summers at Dauphin Island and completes the courses successfully, she can earn a minor in marine science.

As suggested by the course title, Gier's class studied the behavior of marine life. One of their experiments studied the behavior of shrimp who had been infected with parasitic flukes—do they venture out more stupidly, unaware of fish who will prey upon them, thus helping to complete the fluke's life cycle? The fluke depends on that step taking place, and then infecting the fish, which is then eaten by a bird. Many parasites influence their hosts' behavior to ensure their own survival, and Gier's class tested the hypothesis that flukes make the shrimp more careless and more likely to be eaten.

The class caught, marked, and observed the behaviors of crustaceans because the critters are easy to work with, says Gier. "In a tank or on a shoreline, they soon forget you're there watching and they go back to doing the things they would normally do—like courting, mating, foraging, escaping, etc.—so you can watch and take data." Last sum-



mer, each experiment taught Gier one more element than it taught students: which endeavors he'll repeat and which ones he won't.

The 5-week course is on the schedule again for summer 2016 and Gier can hardly wait to jump back into the water. As he pulls out a plaster cast model of ghost crab tunnels and observes the surprising patterns formed, his excitement leaps like fireworks in his eyes. "I just had a ball," he says.

Dr. John Williams, professor of history emeritus, was not only honored with emeritus status after his retirement from full-time teaching, but also was awarded the Presidential Medallion by **President J. Cameron West**. No one can keep this good professor down, though. He's still teaching with the Department of History and Political Science and still photographing the campus and Huntingdon events.



President J. Cameron West and Duke Divinity School Dean Ellen F. Davis signed a Memorandum of Understanding between the College and the divinity school in November 2015. The MOU, entitled Answering the Call: The Huntingdon College-Duke Divinity School Admission Pathway, offers preferred consideration and an early admission decision to any Huntingdon religion student who has earned a cumulative GPA of 3.5 or better and who completes an application for admission and an interview.



Once again, Huntingdon has been included in "best of" rankings published by U.S. News and World Report, Washington Monthly, and the Princeton Review. The Washington Monthly ranking measures student social mobility, collegiate research, and college-wide service. In the Princeton Review and U.S. News guidebooks, Huntingdon ranks among the top tier of colleges and universities in the Southeast region.

Hawk 'Em!

The Hawks achieve a season of firsts in 2015

The Huntingdon Hawks Football Team soared to new heights in 2015, setting a program record for wins with 10; winning the first conference title in program history; advancing to the NCAA-Division III playoffs for the second time; winning the first playoff game in the 13-year history of the program; and garnering the USA South Athletic Conference Sportsmanship Award.

In just their third season in the USA South, the Hawks were undefeated in conference play with a 7-0 record, finishing 10-2 overall. The Hawks are the first USA South team to post a 10-win season.

Huntingdon clinched the USA South title with a 38-14 win over Maryville College November 7, and capped conference play with a 44-13 win over Averett University November 14. With the conference title, Huntingdon earned an automatic bid to the playoffs and hosted Hendrix College in the first round, eliminating the Warriors 38-27 at W. James Samford Jr. Stadium November 21. The win was the 80th in Huntingdon history.

Huntingdon's nine-game winning streak, tied for the longest in school history, came to an end the following week in the second-round playoff game, with a 43-23 loss to 10^{th} -ranked University of Mary Hardin-Baylor in Texas. Still, nothing could dampen the resounding Hawk spirit for all the team accomplished this year.

The Hawks were well represented on the USA South All-Conference team. Senior defensive back **Anthony White** was named Defensive Player of the Year, freshman linebacker **Trey Hayes** was named Defensive Rookie of the Year, and head coach **Mike Turk** was named Coach of the Year. This was the second consecutive year Huntingdon produced the Defensive Player of the Year and the first time the Hawks earned Coach of the Year and Rookie Defensive Player of the Year honors.

In addition to receiving three of the USA South's top five individual awards, 16 Hawks earned first-team or second-team All-Conference recognition. To put that number in perspective, in the team's first two seasons in the conference, 13 Huntingdon players collectively earned All-Conference recognition.

Joining White on the first-team this season were junior quarterback **Luke Bailey**, senior H-Back **Darius Dawsey**, senior offensive lineman **Chael Pridgen**, junior offensive

fensive lineman **Quadarius Belser**, junior offensive lineman **Jesse Williams**, senior defensive lineman **Heath McCray**, senior linebacker **Jake Green** and senior defensive back **Brendon Brown**. Brown also received the individual conference Sportsmanship Award.

The seven Hawks who earned second-team honors were junior running back **John Iwaniec**, junior receiver **Nick Haas**, senior offensive lineman **Brandon Rockett**, junior defensive linemen **Octavis Harris** and **Drew Wheeler**, senior linebacker **Jacob Wright**, and freshman kicker **Chase Young**.

Although the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame's Hampshire Honor Society and the USA South Academic All-Conference team will not be released until the spring and summer of 2016, if previous seasons are any indication, the Hawks expect to be prevalent on these lists again.

During the 2014–15 academic year, Huntingdon led the USA South with 161 student-athletes on the Academic All-Conference team, including 26 football players. Five Hawks earned recognition in the Hampshire Honor Society last season, bringing the total to 43 since the inaugural class in 2007. To be eligible for the Hampshire Society, a senior football player must maintain at least a 3.2 cumulative GPA throughout his college career and meet all NCAA-mandated progress toward degree requirements and graduation.

This was the eighth consecutive winning season for the Hawks and the 10th winning record in 12 seasons under head coach Mike Turk.



Soccer



The Huntingdon men's and women's soccer teams completed their third season in the USA South Athletic Conference this fall. Under first-year head coach **Matt Cooper**, the men's team earned its first berth in the conference tournament. The Hawks finished with a 3-12-3 record. Seven of the 12 losses were decided by one goal and all three ties were in double overtime. The Lady Hawks finished with a 4-10-2 record, winning two more games than the previous season. The Lady Hawks' defense also improved, allowing 35 less goals this season than in 2014. The women's team ended the season on a high note with a 4-1 win over LaGrange. (Pictured: **Tyler DeJianne**)

Volleyball



The Huntingdon volleyball team made tremendous strides under first-year head coach **Latonia Allen**. The Hawks doubled their win total and won five conference matches to finish 15-20 (5-11 USA South). Huntingdon won 9 of its final 13 matches and defeated 3 teams that made the USA South Athletic Conference Tournament.

With 18 underclassmen on the roster, the Hawks will look for continued improvement next season.

Basketball

The Huntingdon women's basketball team posted its fourth straight winning season with a 13-12 record, but iust missed out on a trip to the USA South Athletic Conference Tournament. Highlighting the season was the record-setting performance of senior Pat Pickens (pictured). The Anniston native rewrote the Lady Hawks' NCAA-era record book and ended her career with 17 of the program's career, season and singlegame records. Among her accomplishments, she set the NCAA-era record for points in a season (497) and a career (1,473) and points (37) and rebounds (20) in a game. Pickens, who earned All-Conference recognition in each of her four seasons, became the first Huntingdon women's basketball player to earn All-Region



honors when she was named second-team All-South Region. A season after reaching the USA South Tournament championship game, the men's basketball team struggled to a 3-22 record.

Wrestling



The Huntingdon wrestling team improved from start to finish during its first season of NCAA competition. Freshmen **Mason Baldwin** and **Jesse Herron** picked up the first individual wins of the NCAA era. Huntingdon hosted its first match when Life University came to Roland Arena on Jan. 15. The Hawks concluded the season with a trip to the Central Regional in Dubuque, lowa. **Brewer Gilliland** won the Hawks' only regional match and the Hawks finished 11th in the 13-team field. As the team began the 2015–16 season under new head coach **Craig Duncan**, pictured left with new recruits at July 2015 New Student Orientation, they brought home the first two team wins in the young program's history.

Golf



The Huntingdon women's golf team turned in the best season in its seven-year history. The Lady Hawks shot a program-record 309 in their first tournament, turned in the top nine rounds in program history, won their first tournament and produced their first All-American. LeeAnn Cahoon (left, with Kelsey Spivey) earned second-team All-American honors and first-team All-Region honors. Cahoon also became the first Lady Hawk to

qualify for the NCAA Division III Women's Golf Championships. The men's golf team finished third in the USA South Athletic Conference Tournament. **Will Thrash** earned All-Region honors for the Hawks.

Baseball

The Huntingdon baseball team put together another solid season and won more than 20 games for the eleventh straight season under head coach D.J. Conville '98. With a 24-15 overall record and a 22-8 record in the USA South Athletic Conference, the Hawks finished as the conference runnerup. Freshman Jared Gonzales was named the USA South Rookie Pitcher of the Year and was one of five Hawks to earn All-Conference honors. Joining Gonzalez were first-team selections Jordan Freeman and Anthony Spivey (pictured at



bat) and second-team selections **Patrick Kucera** and **Alec Raley**. Spivey and Freeman also earned All-Region honors.

Softball



In its second season in the USA South Athletic Conference, the Huntingdon softball team was 20-18 and earned a return trip to the conference tournament. The Lady Hawks advanced to the second day of the tournament but failed to advance to the championship round. Counting the final three seasons in the Great South Athletic Conference, the loss snapped a streak of four consecutive seasons playing for a conference championship. Pitcher Katy Messick (pictured) was named honorable mention All-Conference.

Tennis

The Huntingdon men's and women's tennis teams earned return trips to the conference tournament in their second season in the USA South. The men advanced to the semifinals and the women fell in the first round. Bobby Foroughian and Sebastian Riveros Florez represented the men's team as first-team All-Conference selections. On the women's side, senior Hannah Still was named second-team All-Conference and Sarah Warren was an honorable mention. Still closed her Huntingdon career with 62 singles wins, 54 doubles wins and 116 total wins. Lacrosse



The Huntingdon men's lacrosse team struggled to a 6-13 record during its fourth season but finished the season strong. The Hawks won four of their final six games and advanced to the Southeast Independent Lacrosse Championship title game. The SEILC was comprised of the five USA South Athletic Conference teams that compete in men's lacrosse. **Brandon Sewell, Jakob Works** (pictured) and **Glen Troxell** were named to the All-SEILC team. In their third season of competition, the Lady Hawks finished with a 1-14 record. **Jen Price** earned second-team All-Conference honors. The Lady Hawks welcomed head coach **Julia Steier** in the fall of 2015. She joined the eight senior members of her team in lighting the 2015 Huntingdon College Christmas trees.

CELEBRATING CELEBR



President J. Cameron West served as Master of Ceremonies for the dedication of the Cloverdale Campus, and applauded the good work of faculty, staff, Cloverdale neighbors, donors, trustees, and community members in making the purchase and renovation of the property possible.

Purchased in 2001 from the Montgomery School System, the former Cloverdale School facilities and surrounding property added 13 acres to the Huntingdon footprint and endless possibilities for Huntingdon's future. At a dedication and ribbon-cutting ceremony held November 9, 2015, **President J. Cameron West** said, "The transformation, rejuvenation and revitalization of this Cloverdale Campus represent (in the words of my Duke adviser, Geoffrey Wainwright) 'the happy conjunction' of opportunity, vision, and investment."

The addition of the Cloverdale property provided space and facilities ripe for renovation, and allowed Huntingdon to add football as an intercollegiate sport. Football was followed by a marching band, a dance team, men's and women's lacrosse, and the only four-year intercollegiate wrestling program in Alabama—all of which practice, play or perform on the Cloverdale Campus. Saturday, November 7, the same day Huntingdon hosted 224 high school musicians for the Marching Scarlet and Grey's Marching Honor Band, and the same day the Office of Admission's Preview Day brought 200 more prospective students and families to campus, the Huntingdon Hawks clinched their first ever USA South Athletic Conference championship and second trip to NCAA-Division III post-season play-offs.

As the Cloverdale Campus has transformed, the Dr. Laurie Jean Weil Center for Teacher Education and Human Performance, W. James Samford Jr. Stadium, Charles Lee Field, Will and Kelly Wilson Community and Athletic Center, James W. Wilson Jr. Gymnasium, and Leo J. Drum Jr. Theater have brought life to the campus and to the community. Nearly every Huntingdon student takes at least one course that meets in Cloverdale classrooms. The new spaces offer the latest multimedia technology adjacent to blackboards that have served students for generations. A vibrant Tuesday Night Worship service takes place weekly in Drum Theater. Alabama Independent School Association offices are housed in Weil, and a Pro Impact physical therapy clinic is open to students and to neighbors.

48 Midtown, trendy apartments developed by Colonial Properties next to the Cloverdale Campus, opened during summer 2015, and

the increased traffic on the Cloverdale Campus by both Huntingdon and community audiences has also brought steady clientele to Cloverdale restaurants and businesses.

"Huntingdon's growth during the last dozen years—named by the Chronicle of Higher Education in 2014 as one of the 'Fastest-Growing Colleges in America'—would not have been possible if not for leaders and donors who believed in the College's future," said West. "We acknowledge and humbly thank all who participated and helped to fund the property's purchase and renovation."



At a gala celebration following the Cloverdale Dedication, Trustee Chairman **Dave Borden** offered a toast to all that has been and will be accomplished on the campus, and to all of those who gave of their funds, time, and energy in the transformation process.





Donor Spotlight: W. James Samford Jr. Foundation



The W. James Samford Jr. Foundation was inducted into the College's Athletic Hall of Fame during Homecoming 2015. The award was accepted by long-time Huntingdon trustee and sister to W. James Samford Jr., Lucinda Samford Cannon.

W. James "Jimmy" Samford Jr. was born in Opelika, Ala., Feb. 4, 1950, to Evlyn and Bill Samford. He attended Opelika public schools and graduated from Opelika High School in 1968. In 1972 he received a bachelor's degree in political science from

Auburn University, where he was a member of the Alpha Tau Omega fraternity. Jimmy was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force and served three years at Tyndall Air Force Base in Florida. After completing his tour of duty, he attended the University of Alabama School of Law and was admitted to the Alabama Bar in 1978.

From 1978 to 1980, Jimmy was an attorney for the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation in Washington, D.C. He was appointed by former Gov. Fob James to serve as president of the

Alabama Public Service Commission. Several years later he moved from that position to serve as senior legal adviser to Gov. James, after which he opened a private law practice in Montgomery. He was a member of the Auburn University Board of Trustees and is the namesake for the Auburn baseball stadium.

From 1980 until his death in 2003, Jimmy lived in the Old Cloverdale neighborhood of Montgomery, just a few blocks away from Huntingdon College. His presence in the neighborhood continued a legacy of relationship between the Samford family and Huntingdon College, dating back to when the College was first established in Tuskegee. Two of his ancestors were instrumental in steering the College through times of growth and expansion, including his great-great grandfather, William Flewellen Samford, who helped to raise funds to expand the residence halls at Tuskegee Female College (Huntingdon's earliest identity) in 1856. Both of his grandmothers attended Tuskegee Female College.

Multiple major gifts by the W. James Samford Jr. Foundation have propelled Huntingdon athletics into the NCAA era with great momentum, including the construction of the football stadium on the Cloverdale campus, which bears Jimmy Samford's name. Huntingdon's School of Business and Professional Studies is also named in honor of this extraordinary friend of the College.

Coach McWilliams began his Huntingdon coaching career in 1991 after serving 12 years as head tennis coach at Marion Military Institute. During his career, he officiated service lines at the U.S. Open, served as a tennis professional, managed tennis accounts for Wilson Sporting Goods, and founded numerous tennis clubs. 

Judge Truman Hobbs

Long-time Huntingdon friend, neighbor, and U.S. District Judge Truman McGill Hobbs died Nov. 4, 2015, at age 94. Judge Hobbs and his wife, Joyce, are the namesakes for Huntingdon's Joyce and Truman Hobbs Honors Program.

After completing his bachelor's degree at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill in 1942, Hobbs, a native of Alabama, served four years of active duty in the European and Pacific Theaters for

the U.S. Navy during World War II, volunteering as a hazardous duty deep-sea diver. He achieved the rank of Lieutenant Commander and earned the Bronze Star and the Navy-Marine Corps Medal of Heroism. He then completed his juris doctorate



degree at Yale University School of Law in 1948. He served as a law clerk for U.S. Supreme Court Justice Hugo Black from 1948 to 1949, then became a private practice attorney in Alabama. During his long career, Hobbs served as president of the Alabama Bar Association, the Alabama Trial Lawyers Association, and the Montgomery County Bar Association. He was nominated to the federal judgeship for the Middle District of Alabama by President Jimmy Carter in 1980. He served as chief judge of the court from 1984 until 1991, when he assumed senior status.

Lane served as head men's tennis coach from 2006 until his death, one week shy of induction into the USTA Alabama Tennis Foundation Hall of Fame. He received the Career Achievement Award from the Alabama Tennis Association and was a 1998 inductee into the Huntingdon College Athletic Hall of Fame. His long career in tennis included the Blue-Gray Tennis Association's Jim Wilson Jr. Giving Back with Grace Award, as well.

In eight seasons with the men's team, Lane guided Huntingdon to

a 91-48 record, three Great South Athletic Conference tournament championships, and one regular season title. He was a two-time GSAC Coach of the Year.

Kent Hagan '11 played for Lane for four seasons and is a first-year resident at the University of Pennsylvania Medical Center. "[Coach Lane] fought his sickness the same way he lived, with humor and optimism," said Hagan. "He is one of the most amazing people I've had the pleasure of knowing. As a player, sometimes you get frustrated or discouraged, and he would always remind us, even on our worst days, how lucky we were to be out there."

Before returning to Huntingdon, Lane spent three seasons at St. James School in Montgomery. Lane also worked for the City of Montgomery Parks and Recreation Department as a tennis director for the City of Montgomery, helping to set up the O'Connor Tennis Center, where he developed tennis programs for children and adults and served as director of the program until 1991. He then joined Buckmasters as the first national chapter director, launching the American Deer Foundation, a non-profit organization that raises money to feed the hungry across the United States.

A native of Sylacauga, Lane came to Huntingdon in 1967 to earn a degree in physical education. He played No. 1 singles for the Hawks for four years, leading the tennis team to its first conference championship. He was named among the Outstanding College Athletes of America in 1971.

Mr. Ken Williams

Ken Williams, associate professor emeritus of mathematics and computer science, died Feb. 7, 2015, in a fire that consumed the Montgomery home he shared with his wife, **Jane T. Williams**, a retired long-time member of the Huntingdon College staff. Jane Williams was visiting their daughter, Beth, in Auburn at the time of the fire.

"Ken Williams and his wife, Jane, have been part of the fabric of Huntingdon for more than 40 years," said Huntingdon President J. Cameron West. "Nearly every student who took a mathematics class from 1969 through 2007 experienced Ken Williams' wit and his love for mathematics. He was a patient, kind teacher who went out of his way to ensure his students' success. This couple is well-known and well-loved among generations of Huntingdon students."

Ken Williams was a fixture in the Huntingdon Department of Mathematics from 1969 through his retirement in 2007. He received the Winn and Gordon Chappell Academic Enrichment Award for exceptional student engagement and achievement in the arts and sciences and the Rhoda C. Ellison Distinguished Faculty Lifetime Service Award at Huntingdon's 2007 Commencement Exercises. He was awarded emeritus status in 2008.

Williams, a native of Auburn, Ala., earned his bachelor's degree in electrical engineering from Auburn University in 1962. He served for three years as a civilian computer engineer with the United States Air Force's SHAPE headquarters at the Hague. Upon his return to the United States he completed a Master of Science in mathematics at Auburn. He was working toward his doctorate in mathematics when his major adviser died, causing him to abandon his doctoral studies in order to concentrate on teaching.

Williams was hired as a member of faculty at Huntingdon in 1969 and taught for nearly 40 years. He was responsible for the installation and operation of the College's first computers. During his tenure, he served on four accreditation self-study teams, authoring the 2000 Self-Study. He directed the College's Computer Center for a number of years and sponsored the Math and Computer Science Club. An anglophile at heart, Williams avidly studied English history, concentrating on the Tudor dynasty, Churchill, WWII, and the Battle of Britain. He and Jane Williams, along with other members of faculty, led several Huntingdon travel-study groups in London and Paris.

The family has designated that unrestricted gifts may be made in Williams' memory to Huntingdon College or to the American Spaniel Club Foundation.
