

# TEACHING MATTERS

# We have accepted the responsibility of shaping someone's future, and we don't take that lightly.

Teachers unlock doors. They open passageways to knowledge. They inspire students to step beyond the comfortable, learn new possibilities for their lives, appreciate and use their own gifts, and strive to grasp what they don't know.

Teaching matters.

More importantly, good teaching matters.

Beginning with its opening days as Tuskegee Female College 164 years ago, Huntingdon has been a teaching institution. The College's first president, Andrew Adgate Lipscomb, chalked the vision for the College's teaching atmosphere.

"Great teachers, he felt, are those 'who could be scientific in statement, in argument, in detail, and yet carry the fervor of a glowing soul into all their efforts." He had a horror of 'scholars, mere scholars, chained down to their college-chairs," thinking machines rather than thinking souls. His own memories of college days were brightened by 'the hereditary anecdotes of the college—the dry humor of some old professor—the fun of classmates." (The History of Huntingdon College: 1854–1954, Rhoda Coleman Ellison, page 29)

Huntingdon College's academic hallmark has always been excellence in teaching. Because of the College's size, that excellence begins and ends with relationships.

"We have accepted the responsibility of shaping someone's future," says **Dr. Anna McEwan**, provost and dean of the College. "And we don't take that responsibility lightly. Huntingdon pre-service teachers, Huntingdon faculty—all of us who are engaged in the art of teaching—understand that we're doing much more than delivering content and developing competencies. We hold ourselves to a high standard because we are a teaching institution."

"When alumni return for Homecoming and other Huntingdon events, what they talk about most is how much their professors inspired them," says **Anthony Leigh**, senior vice president for institutional development and alumni relations. "I hear about Dr. Rhoda Coleman Ellison, Dr. Gordon Chappell, Dr. Mary Jane Brannon, Dr. Thomas Staton ... and so many others. I think those vivid memories, more than anything else, illustrate the power of good teaching at Huntingdon."

Educators who have joined Huntingdon's teaching ranks more recently have continued the storied teaching relationships and traditions while bringing a modern twist to the classroom experience.

"Every day I see another professor who is role-playing in class; or having students work in groups to illustrate a concept; or engaging students in a simulation about global concerns; or touring the Hyundai plant with students to discuss management style contrasts; or touring a law firm to discuss the ethical dilemmas faced by today's lawyers; or trudging through swamps to forage for flora and fauna. One faculty member is building a robotics lab to teach her students mathematics. The library has engaged students and faculty in celebration of the 20th anniversary of Harry Potter this year with their Hogwarts at Huntingdon series. Active learning; engaged learning; memorable learning takes place in exercises like these," says McEwan.

Most Huntingdon faculty members serve as academic advisers for their students. While helping students choose their classes, more important conversations take place. Discussions about what students like to learn, how they learn best, and what they'd like to do professionally introduce new career directions and inspire students to think about new possibilities for their lives. In this way, advising forms a bond and becomes a mentoring relationship that continues far beyond graduation.

"I think about it every day—how well my Huntingdon faculty prepared me for graduate school," says Lexie Ofe '17, a student at Vanderbilt Divinity School. "When I spoke with Dr. [Jason] Borders [professor of religion] about the next-to-last draft of my [Huntingdon religion] capstone, he said, 'This is very good work. But ... let

me just ask you: do you think it is graduate-level work?' He knew how much I cared about that project, so he nudged me in his simultaneously ever-so-kind-yet-burning way to give it all I've got. I took it home and poured my heart into it for the whole weekend, and to this day it means more to me than anything else I've written. Now that I'm in graduate school, I can do it right the first time—because my dear professor and friend taught me how."

Faculty partnerships with the Center for Career and Vocation have led to the annual Meet the Firms accounting placement event, the Pre-Health Professions Fair, road trips to law schools and seminaries, and the Teacher Education Job Fair, among other events. Together, faculty and the CCV have also forged numerous internships and externships for students. Active learning informs students not only about the subjects they're studying, but also about themselves as learners—their skills, likes, and dislikes—and through real world work, real world connections form. Internships can shape future career decisions more than any other learning factor.

The teaching approach at Huntingdon inspires those who are called to teach, themselves, to pay the good classroom efforts forward. "Teachers can impact—positively or negatively—the way a student feels about school," says Raina Lanier '18, an Elementary Education/Collaborative Special Education major. I want my students to know their self-worth after being in my classroom, and for each of them to know that if they work hard, they can accomplish their dreams."

Hogwarts wasn't the only thing that came to Huntingdon with the library series. A few "fantastic beasts" accompanied the wizards.

When I started graduate school at UNC-Chapel Hill, I was pretty certain that I would ultimately look for a faculty position at a research-focused institution after graduating. However, after serving as an instructor for a Child Development course, I completely fell in love with teaching. Soon after, I decided that while I was still committed to research, my true calling was to be a teacher. Thus, I determined that a teaching-focused institution would be the best fit for me. I was attracted to Huntingdon because of its small size and its emphasis on meaningful student-teacher interactions. I was excited by the idea of having smaller class sizes and the opportunity to really get to know my students.

I was delighted to find that being a professor here is so much more than just teaching. It's getting the opportunity to really mentor students and work with them throughout their college journey. The positive changes I see in my students from freshman year to graduation are astounding, and they make my job so rewarding in a way that I didn't know was possible. Only at a place like Huntingdon would you ever be able to closely witness that kind of development in every single one of your majors. And why is their development so remarkable? It's because of the amazing professors, staff, and administrators at Huntingdon who truly care about the academic success and overall wellbeing of all of our students. Never have I seen such commitment to student learning and happiness.

I love teaching because every day I get the opportunity to inspire my students to become as passionate about psychology as I am. And my students inspire me because they help

me see my field in new and interesting ways. I also enjoy helping my students to think in creative ways as they apply their growing knowledge from their coursework here to real-world problems. For example, just yesterday in my Abnormal Psychology class, my students and I were thinking about possible phone apps that would allow caregivers to better assist and monitor their aging loved ones with Alzheimer's Disorder.

One of my other favorite things about working at Huntingdon is that when students graduate, they don't disappear from your life. I have been able to keep in touch with students via the alumni office or social media. Again, it's so rewarding to see the continued journey of our students and their successes in graduate school and/or their careers. I'd like to think I have contributed to my students' lives in meaningful ways, but I know for certain that they have impacted my life in so many priceless and unforgettable ways. I am so grateful to be a small part of their journey.

Dr. Kristi Copping, or "Doc Cop," as she is known by her students, is an associate professor of psychology and chairs the Department of Communication Studies and Psychology. She earned her Ph.D. and M.A. in developmental psychology at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill and her B.A. in psychology at the University of Michigan-Ann Arbor. She was honored with Huntingdon's Julia Lightfoot Sellers Award for Excellence in Teaching in 2015.

# AN INTERVIEW WITH DR. ANNA McEWAN

No man is an island,
Entire of itself,
Every man is a piece of the continent,
A part of the main.

There's a sense of serenity amid the laughter emanating from the Office of the Provost, in spite of the flurry as the College begins its 164<sup>th</sup> year. **Dr. Anna McEwan**, almost always smiling and usually sporting the school colors, brings stoic wisdom couched in freeing fun. Witness the car she drives: a zippy bright scarlet hybrid. Just outside her door is her treasured assistant, **Kim Kirkland**, whom she brought with her from the University of Montevallo.

Dr. McEwan joined Huntingdon as provost and dean of the college in July 2017. A career-long educator, she began teaching elementary school in Florida after completing her undergraduate studies in elementary education at Asbury College. While teaching, she completed her Master of Arts in Education at the University of West Florida. She went on to earn a Ph.D. in education at Florida State University, and it was there that she decided to focus her career in higher education.

With her phone by her side so that she can tweet out a hurrah for faculty or student achievement—she does so at least once daily—Dr. McEwan sat down to tell us a little more about her background and her perspective about her new role.

#### What led you into the field of education?

I was determined not to be a teacher because there were already so many educators in my family, and I wanted to cut my own path. But then I started working with children in summer programs—camps and other activities—and realized I was **good** at it and found joy in doing it. Teaching is my calling, and it doesn't matter to me if I'm teaching young children, college students, adults in Sunday School ... good teaching is good teaching.

# When did your plan change to administration, and how did you take that next step?

It was very natural. I've tended to emerge as a leader when opportunities presented themselves. You step into a role, and that role leads to another role. When I was in my first position as an assistant professor, the person directing the graduate program passed away, so I stepped in and continued as director of graduate studies. Then I became the director of the elementary education program at Asbury. At every place there have been doors, and I've taken the chance to broaden and further develop my skills in every position.

At the heart of teaching is the notion of serving. When I walk into a classroom, I'm thinking, what do these students need, and what can I provide them so they can grow? I take the same approach to leadership. It's not about status or power, it's about "What do

these people need?" What impediments can I remove? Creating conditions where people can flourish—that's what leaders do. Creating conditions in which others can learn, that's what teachers do. It's not about me, or about credit, it's about seizing opportunities to serve.

#### When did you decide that becoming a provost was your goal?

I was dean of a college with 900 students for 11 years. During that time, I helped rescue a program from accreditation troubles. We added new degree programs. We reorganized the entire administrative structure, without loss of momentum or morale, so I began thinking that I could do this on a broader institutional level.

# At Montevallo, you oversaw a program called the Vertical Teaming Initiative. How did that program develop, and can you foresee similar community partnerships at Huntingdon?

I think leadership is about putting initiatives in place to address a particular problem. The Vertical Teaming Initiative came from college preparedness issues we were seeing among incoming students. So I thought, rather than whining, let's try to do something about it. We brought people together from high schools, the community college, and the university, and we discussed incoming students: what they're like, what they need. We discovered the problems of incoming students were more about soft skills: work ethic, emotional intelligence, and responsibility. Professors decided we could fill in academic gaps, but we needed help with some of the other problems—someone who's never done homework or hasn't learned to study or time manage, think critically, ask questions. We agreed to focus on these issues together.

I like listening to other voices. Two heads are better than one. In the end, you come out with a richer solution. I have a friend who says, "All problems have a simple solution, and it's usually wrong." Problems are complex, and they require finely nuanced answers. There are no quick fixes here, either. We can't simply look at what another college is doing, adopt that model, and expect it to work here.

# What strengths do you see in Huntingdon's academic programs and faculty? How can Huntingdon build on those strengths?

Our faculty are so well-qualified. We have some powerfully credentialed people, and they love to teach. They're not trying to move somewhere else, or to climb the publication ladder; they're really dedicated to being the best they can be at a teaching-focused institution.

We need to share a little more with each other, and in our private circles I want to get faculty talking with each other. I want to celebrate the great things we do with students and in our classes. I like to brag on faculty so I hope we'll have a lot of peer sharing—faculty teaching each other. I also want to get the word out to the broader education community. The competitive part of me wants to kick butt! I want to find ways to elevate the profile of the faculty in general and the institution as a whole.

# How do you compare your experience with public and private higher education?

I think the treasure lies in liberal arts education, whether public or private, but I think Huntingdon's treasure also lies in being faith-based. I believe in the ideals associated with the liberation of the mind, and I like the focus of those kinds of institutions. When you pair that with being a faith-based institution, I find a sense of coherence that mirrors who I am. At a private institution like Huntingdon, there is a richer environment, with opportunities to put faith in action.

#### Do you have a personal creed or philosophy that you live by?

I carry a card with me all the time. It has the words: Serve, Love, Encourage, Uplift. That's what I do. I'm constantly asking myself, how can I serve? How can I find ways to love unconditionally?

# Are teaching and leading a ministry for you?

Teaching and leading are a ministry. "Work is my mission and mission is my work," as the saying goes. It is irrelevant where you find yourself teaching or leading, you are in ministry. You're still teaching. You're still leading. You can still articulate why you make the decisions you do, as well as how those decisions connect with your values and beliefs.

# What do you love about teaching, and what do you love about leading?

I love the creativity of teaching. No two classes are ever the same, no two days and no two students are ever the same. You're constantly having to adjust, evolve, rethink. You can't get bored. I love the opportunity to open doors and see lightbulbs come on for students—to push them. I love the challenge of seeing them grow.

I like best when others flourish under my leadership; to see faculty and staff members being generative, creative, happy. I love creating the conditions where they are blazing the trail, and I just have to get out of the way. I like seeing when others become leaders themselves, become self-directed, motivated, willing to take risks—the evolution of someone feeling like they can make a difference, that what they do matters, and that someone will acknowledge their work.

# Your doctoral research focused on the moral dimension of teaching and its relationship to classroom practice. How will that research inform your work here?

That research informs my life. When you complete a dissertation it becomes part of the fabric of who you are, I think.

I believe every encounter is a moral encounter, so it matters whether or not I smile, sneer, eye roll. Every encounter is a moral encounter, therefore the level of awareness I must constantly try to maintain is enormous. When you realize you're not an island—the John Donne poem—"every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main." That changes the way I teach, lead, raise children, maintain friendships—the notion of living an other-focused life—then I feel like I'm living the Christian life. The lessons I learned through that study stay with me.

# What else do you hope the Huntingdon family will know about you?

I hope the Huntingdon community will know that this person in this office has one goal: to serve and advance this institution while serving and advancing the kingdom of God.

Dr. McEwan and her husband, Paul, met at Asbury College and have been married for 34 years. He teaches science at Hoover High School and was named Alabama's Secondary Teacher of the Year in 2017. Their daughter, Hannah, is an elementary educator and lives with her husband, Zane, in Moody, Ala. Son Aaron is a first-year graduate student at the University of Alabama on his way toward becoming a college professor in communication studies.



It's 4:00 p.m. Every fiber of Flowers Hall vibrates as the Marching Scarlet and Grey drum line beats out the Fight Song from the front porch of Smith Hall.

It's not an unusual day. The band isn't preparing for any one performance, or for encouraging any one team. They're practicing for all of the performances they'll have in the future, putting that horn sound in the right place, clipping the beat just so on a given measure.

Music has been part of Huntingdon College from its earliest days, when only women attended. They gathered in song for glee clubs and they practiced piano and other instruments. After all, music shares an experience like no other language can.

"I love working with students. I love the creativity ... the passion," says **Dr. Damion Womack**, new chair of the Department of Fine Arts at Huntingdon. "In choral music, each piece has a story. The first thing I go to [when I'm teaching a new piece] is the text—whether sacred or secular. You're able to tell stories."

Womack has taught music and directed choral programs for many years in schools—most recently at the Montgomery Academy, where he served as Director of Arts, garnering the McLemore Award for Excellence in Teaching. He also directs music for Memorial Presbyterian Church in Montgomery. He joined the

Huntingdon faculty in the fall of 2017, bringing with him expertise gained in years of choral directing and competition.

The Huntingdon Concert Choir took the stage under his direction for the first time at the 2017 Presidential Convocation, traditionally the formal opening event of the academic year. Already, after being behind the baton for only a few weeks, he'd put in place a High School Honor Choir for February 2018 and planned a season of performances for his singers.

"Text first, then notes, rhythms, harmonies," says Womack. "Then you can begin to be expressive and tell the story—to match the composer's intent through phrasing, line, spacing, and tone."


When asked what inspires him most about music at Huntingdon, Womack says immediately, "potential. President West and Dr. McEwan have a strong interest in choral music and the arts. The students really want to continue the choral tradition."

Music teaches life lessons. Just as teamwork does. Just as leadership does. Womack believes those lessons include discipline, character, faith.

Right now, he's at that teaching-the-text phase. Learning the students. Learning the school. Finding and moving the right spaces for music to shine. The band, for example, will move into their own practice facility fashioned in the old pool space in Roland Student Center later this year. That move will free some elbow room for the choir to take over the practice facility in the upper-level of Smith Hall.

Womack serves as the American Choral Directors Association national chairman for high school choirs. He's in demand as a conductor and clinician.

Womack plans a travel/outreach tour in Alabama for the spring of 2018. In future years, he hopes to shepherd his singers to Carnegie Hall and eventually to Europe. Competition looms as a goal for later years, as well. But his present focus is to "Just make music and touch lives." That's a refrain we can all sing. ■





# TEACHING UP

# Three summer academies focus high school students' vision both inwardly and beyond college.

June—that about-to-be-hotter-than-fire month in Alabama—brought several dozen new minds to campus in 2017. Young minds eager to learn, to find focus, to direct skills in new ways inspired faculty and staff alike as three summer academies for high school students gathered and disbursed, on fire toward new directions in their lives.

# **HUNTINGDON LEADERSHIP ACADEMY**

In its third year, the Huntingdon Leadership Academy welcomed 40 rising high school juniors and seniors for a week-long immersion experience, June 25-30. Arriving from United Methodist churches across Alabama and the Florida panhandle, the students explored their calling to ministry vocations. The five-day academy provided mentoring, discussion of current topics in the life of the church, cultural and mission-related events, and time for fun, praise, and worship.

Lectures were led by Duke Divinity School Professor Dr. J. Warren Smith and by Huntingdon Department of Religion faculty. Worship was led by Huntingdon staff and guest preachers. Students served for Friendship Mission Thrift Store, toured notable civil rights sites in Montgomery, visited River Oaks Farm, and viewed works at the Montgomery Museum of Fine Arts. Group discussions and fellowship opportunities rounded out the week's activities.

"This program, in keeping with Huntingdon's emphasis on helping college students to discern and follow their vocational calling, provides vital early intervention for young people who are hungry to serve and who have the gifts and graces for ministry," said **President J. Cameron West**. "A call to ministry can be lived out in

many ways, in addition to serving as an ordained pastor. We're thrilled to work with bright and forward-thinking young people who understand the essential role spirituality plays in a fulfilling life-path; and likewise, who understand the need for careful and strong leadership in the church and in society."

The Rev. Macon Armistead '14 (left) serves as director of HLA. "One of our students arrived on

Sunday afternoon and appeared rather uninterested in being at the Huntingdon Leadership Academy," says Armistead. "After approaching him on that first day, I was disheartened because I could tell that he desperately did not want to be here. Over the course of the week, I saw this student making friends, laughing and having fun, and even sharing a testimony during our student-led worship service. At the final gathering with all of our students, mentors, and staff, this student expressed a call to ministry that became realized during HLA. I am grateful that the Lord can be personal enough to call each and every one of us, but also so much bigger than our own perceptions and hardened hearts."

Dates for 2018 are set for June 24–29. Students and their churches contribute toward the cost of participation, \$50 each, with the remainder provided by a grant from Lilly Endowment Inc. as part of its High School Youth Theology Institutes Initiative.

# HUNTINGDON ECONOMIC AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT SCHOLARS

Twenty-five rising high school seniors representing most regions of Alabama were part of the first annual Huntingdon College Economic and Community Development Scholars Program in mid-June. Planned in partnership with and sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce Association of Alabama, the Economic Development Association of Alabama, and the Alabama Department of

2017 ECDS students participated in a ribbon-cutting ceremony for their "graduation."



Commerce, ECDS introduced young citizens who are poised to begin their professional journeys to the importance of economic and community development.

Students were selected for participation in the program by their area Chamber of Commerce Association. For the program, the students were divided into five communities, each of which vied to entice a corporation to settle in their area. The students toured local businesses and Alabama government offices, met with Alabama Governor Kay Ivey, heard from professionals seasoned in the importance and processes of economic and community development, and participated in economic and community development simulations. Participants "graduated" from the program wearing hard hats for ground-breaking and ribbon-cutting simulations.

"We were excited to have 25 of Alabama's brightest lights on campus," said Huntingdon senior vice president **Anthony Leigh**, an architect of the program. "These students have returned to their communities enlightened about what economic and community developers do, and we hope that knowledge has given them an appreciation for the work of growing and bettering our communities and our state."

# HUNTINGDON HEALTH SCIENCES ACADEMY

Seventeen rising high school seniors participated in the first annual Huntingdon College Health Sciences Academy in June. During the three-day academy, students received personalized white coats, participated in Huntingdon alumni discussions about health professions, conducted experiments in hands-on health-related laboratories, and assembled health kits in a service project for the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR). The academy concluded with a graduation ceremony and luncheon.

According to academy director **Dr. Maureen Kendrick Murphy** '78, professor of chemistry, the healthcare industry is one of the few fields which, despite difficult economic woes, is hiring at an astounding rate. Jobs in the health sciences are expected to grow faster than any other industry—roughly 22%, or 3.2 million new jobs, by 2018. The purpose of the academy was to address the demand for healthcare professionals and to help rising high school seniors who are interested in health care professions to recognize where their talents and interests fit with the industry's needs.

"Huntingdon has a long-standing tradition of excellent placement rates for graduates into medical, dental, pharmacy, optometry, physician assistant, accelerated nursing, and public health schools," said Murphy. "Based upon the success of this year's event and the evaluations of the student participants, we hope to expand HHSA for summer 2018."

Students were selected for participation after an application process. Murphy and the other Huntingdon faculty will continue to serve as mentors to participants as they explore career options. "These students enriched our lives and spaces with their presence and engagement," said Murphy. "They were an excellent first class. This is the class by which all future HHSA classes will be measured."





Huntingdon College will form a new scholarship and student learning cohort known as the Community Leadership Program beginning fall 2018. For the program, a four-year cohort of entering first-year students interested in helping Alabama communities grow and prosper will be selected. Interested high school seniors may apply for consideration by February 1 at <a href="https://www.huntingdon.edu/community-leadership">www.huntingdon.edu/community-leadership</a>.

Students may major in any area and be part of the program. As part of the Community Leadership Program, students will participate in field trips, community development simulations, special guest lectures, and think-tanks on topics that influence community development.

"In order for our communities to thrive, we need to develop citizens' thinking regarding how they can be part of that community-building process," said Huntingdon College President J. Cameron West. "Rather than looking solely toward elected officials to make our communities thrive—and they certainly have a role—citizens need to understand that they have a role as well. Huntingdon has always been focused on developing graduates who are tuned into the College's core

values of faith, wisdom, and service, not only for their own lives, but also for their communities. The Community Leadership Program promises not only to reshape how students think, but also to influence the places and spaces where they live after graduating."

The idea for the program grew out of the College's Economic and Community Development Scholars summer program.

Community Leadership Program (CLP) Scholars, who will be given \$13,500 tuition scholarships, may explore a number of different topics. "There are so many important topics we can look at through the eyes and guidance of leaders who have addressed or are addressing these issues," said West. "How does access to education affect a community's leadership base? How do safe water and waste management affect community health? How do interstates and roadways, shopping access, education, and recreation affect a community's ability to attract new enterprises? These are all such important topics—and there are so many more—we can address together. CLP is designed to develop an awareness of the issues and a new mindset toward addressing them."

# Fall Sports

#### **CROSS COUNTRY**

Huntingdon restarted its men's and women's cross country programs in the fall of 2017. Under first-year head coach **Dan August**, the teams competed in six events, wrapping up the season in the USA South Athletic Conference Championships.

#### **FOOTBALL**

The Hawks Football Team captured the USA South Athletic Conference title November 4 with a win over Methodist University, the third consecutive year for clinching the conference championship. Head Coach Mike Turk was named USA South Coach of the Year for the third consecutive year and Linell Tarver '21 was named USA South Defensive Rookie of the Year. The Hawks advanced to round one of the NCAA-Division III championships. Huntingdon's first-team All-Conference selections were running back Vic Jerald '18, receiver Otis Porter '19, H-Back Colton Chinn '20, offensive linemen Chris Hering '19 and Adam Mann '19, linebacker Trey Hayes '19, and defensive back Jarrett White '19. Named to the second team were quarterback Chip Taylor '18, linebacker Brandon Williams '20, defensive backs Anthony Wood '18 and Demetrius Beverly '18, and kicker Chase Young '19. This was the 10th straight winning season for the Hawks and the 12th winning season in 14 seasons under Coach Turk.



#### SOCCER

The Huntingdon women's soccer team turned in its best season of the NCAA era, posting an 11-7-1 record and advancing to the quarterfinals of the USA South Athletic Conference Tournament. The team set its NCAA-era season records for wins (11), most shutouts (9), fewest goals allowed (19), most assists (22) and

most points (90). The team's 34 goals this season were the third-most of the NCAA era. **Elena Guy '21** was selected as a second-team West Division All-Conference player. The men's team finished with a 2-14-1 record, highlighted by an 8-0 win over Berea and a 1-0 win over Covenant.

#### **VOLLEYBALL**

The Huntingdon volleyball team posted its first winning season since 2009 and finished with a 19-18 record. The 19 wins were the most for the Hawks in at least a decade. In its fifth season in the USA South Athletic Conference, Huntingdon earned its second appearance in the conference tournament and won its first conference tournament match.



# Winter Sports

#### BASKETBALL

The Huntingdon women's basketball team earned 20 wins for the first time in the NCAA era, reached the USA South Athletic Conference Tournament for the first time, and won its first conference tournament game to cap the 2016-17 season, finishing with a 20-7 record. Juliette Harp '18 earned first-team All-Conference honors, set the program's NCAA-era records for rebounds and blocked shots in a season, and finished with the third most points in a season dur-



ing the NCAA era. Twelve women's basketball players earned Academic All-Conference honors. The men's team finished with a 2-23 record and will be looking for improved results during the 2017–18 season under new head coach **Caleb Kimbrough**. Six Hawks were named to the Academic All-Conference team.

#### **WRESTLING**

The third-year Huntingdon wrestling program continued to make strides, winning five dual matches and four individual in the NCAA Division III Central Regional Tournament. **DeAndre Beck '18** (141 pounds) finished sixth in the Central Regional, marking the highest finish by a Hawk yet. Beck was named a National Wrestling Coaches Association Scholar All-American and the Huntingdon team was named an NWCA Scholar Team. Ten wrestlers earned Academic All-Conference honors.






# Spring Sports

#### BASEBALL

The Huntingdon baseball team advanced to the USA South Athletic Conference Tournament for a second consecutive season. The Hawks finished with a 13-24 record but closed the season with a win over Oglethorpe. Taylor Fought '18 and Wes Powell '20 earned second-team All-Conference honors and 32 players were named Academic All-Conference.



The first-year beach volleyball program won two matches, playing primarily against more established Division I and Division II programs. The Hawks hosted the other two Division III teams at Samford Stadium. Huntingdon beat Principia 3-2 for the first win in Hawks history. In the win, the No. 2 team of Bria Rochelle '18 and Alexis Creasman '20 won the first individual match in program history 21-13, 21-16. The No. 1 team of Audrianna Hargitt '18 and Shelby Young '20 and the No. 4 team of Lexie DeVuyst '20 and Alex Hillman '20 also won to clinch the team victory. The team produced 12 Academic All-Conference selections.

### GOLF

The Huntingdon men's golf team turned in another dominant season, earning a No. 1 ranking in Division III for the majority of the 2016-17 season and finishing fourth in the NCAA Men's Golf Championship. Huntingdon won 5 tournaments and placed in the top 4 in all 10 tournaments. The five wins were the second most in a season for the Hawks during the NCAA era. Director of Golf Dave Schreyer '89 was recognized as the Division III National Coach of the Year, South Region Coach of the Year, and the USA South Athletic Conference Coach of the Year. Addison Lambeth '17 was named first-team All-America.

All-Region, and was the USA South Golfer of the Year. Will Thrash '17 was named second-team All-America, an Academic All-America Scholar, All-Region, and first-team All-Conference. Stephen Shephard '19 was named second-team All-America, All-Region, and honorable mention All-Conference; and Chad Ring '17 was named

honorable mention All-America, an Academic All-America Scholar, All-Region, and second-team All-Conference. On the women's side, **LeeAnn Cahoon** '17 opened the season with the best round in program history with a 1-under-par 69 and earned the first individual win in Lady Hawks' history in the BSC Southern Shootout. **Courtney Harville** '17 was named an All-American Scholar for a fourth season and 15 men's and women's golfers earned Academic All-Conference honors.

#### **LACROSSE**

The Huntingdon men's lacrosse team tied its record for wins in a season and finished with a 10-8 record. Huntingdon hosted the Southeast Independent Lacrosse Championship tournament at Samford Stadium and lost in the semifinals. **Matt** 



Murphy '19 was named the SEILC Defensive Player of the Year and was named to the All-Conference team with Kendrick Ballard '18, Sam Hitt '19, and Josh Clayton '17. Seventeen Hawks earned Academic All-Conference recognition from the USA South. The fifth-year women's lacrosse team finished with a 3-11 record but closed the season with a 15-5 win over LaGrange. Nine Lady Hawks earned Academic All-Conference honors.

#### **TENNIS**

The Huntingdon men's and women's tennis teams returned to the USA South Athletic Conference Tournament for a fourth straight season. The Lady Hawks advanced to the tournament semifinals and finished the season with a 15-6 record. The 15



wins marked the 13th consecutive season the women have won at least 10 matches. **Dusty Catala '20** was named USA South first-team West Division and **Mariah Bastos '20** and **Josie Waddell '19** were named second-team West Division. Five Lady Hawks were named Academic All-Conference and four were chosen as ITA Scholar Athletes. This was the 12th time since 2004 the Lady Hawks were recognized as an ITA All-Academic team. On the men's side, the Hawks reached the first round of the conference tournament and finished with a 7-14 record. **John Jones '18** was selected first-team West Division and five Hawks earned Academic All-Conference honors.

#### SOFTBALL

The Huntingdon softball team made its fourth straight appearance in the USA South Athletic Conference Tournament and finished with an 18-26 record. Under first-year head coach Casey Chrietzberg '09, the Lady Hawks advanced to the second day of the conference tournament. Samara Miller '20 was named first-team All-Conference and 10 softball players were named Academic All-Conference. ■

# Sullivan Award presented to Karl and Brenda Stegall

Huntingdon College **President J. Cameron West** and the College's Board of Trustees honored Karl and Brenda Stegall with the Mary Mildred Sullivan Award in May 2017. The award, sponsored by the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Foundation, is given only by selected "representative institutions" in the southern United States to non-student members of their college communities and seeks to perpetuate excellence of character and humanitarian service. Honorees demonstrate a "spirit of helpfulness and an awareness of the beauty and value of the intangible elements of life," such that "the spiritual standard of the institution may be judged by the character of the person to whom the award is made."

Karl Stegall served for more than 40 years in ministry and as both a pastor and a district superintendent in the Alabama-West Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church. Since his retirement in 2007, he has devoted his time to the Stegall Seminary Scholarship Endowment Foundation as its volunteer president. The foundation was established to provide seminary scholarships for students from the AWF Conference. In the past decade, the Stegall Foundation has awarded more than \$3 million in scholarships to more than 180 United Methodist students from the AWF Conference studying in seminaries.



Throughout the Stegalls' ministry, Brenda Stegall taught elementary Sunday School classes and directed children's choirs in most of the churches where her husband was appointed. The Stegalls were married in 1965.

"Karl and Brenda Stegall are truly partners with Huntingdon College, serving with the College fruitfully and powerfully to advance the United Methodist Church's missional priority of preparing the next generation of leaders for the church and the world," said West. "The Stegalls intend to devote the rest of their lives to providing financial assistance for seminarians who are struggling financially. Without question, Karl and Brenda Stegall embody the highest ideals of Huntingdon College."




