We can't fulfill our plans for students, for example, without the funding to do so, and without the space or facilities to complete the vision. We can't provide the learning objectives unless we have the students who want and can benefit from the programs. And so on, and so on.

CONTINUING THE JOURNEY

Building Great Lives

2018 has been touted as the Year of the Woman, especially in reference to the number of women who ran for political office—and won. Perhaps, then, the Huntingdon Student Government Association executive council (EC) elections in March were a predictor of things to come, as every elected position went to the woman candidate.

Certainly, these women are making their mark on Huntingdon history. Much like a white blaze trail marker on the Appalachian Trail, they have set their course to bring order and direction to SGA meetings.

Virginia Gaston '20 is the daughter (Jackie Gaston '90 and Mary Shea Buchanan Gaston '91), niece (Jennifer Gaston Rodopoulos '88 and Steve Rodopoulos '90), and granddaughter (Maryetta Propst Buchanan '62) of alums. As vice president, she oversees the Senate meetings, which occur every Monday evening at 9:00. The EC doubled the senate this year, asking for two representatives from organizations and majors where there used to be just one. Now, there are 75 senators, and average attendance is 68.

"Virginia has really made a difference by reinstituting parliamentary procedure for SGA meetings," says **Jordan Fleming '20**, secretary.

"Order is important," agrees **Savannah Gibbs '20**, president. Also a legacy, she is the daughter of **Elizabeth Taylor Gibbs '94**. "Not only does order help us get things done, it gives everyone the opportunity to learn how to be professional and personable at the same time. We're all going to need those skills in our professional lives."

"Order has also helped us create a safe environment," says Gaston. "I think we've made SGA a place where everyone feels like their voices are heard and they can speak honestly about a topic. It's been very helpful for me, professionally, because I have to consider everyone's opinions, weigh them, and determine whose hold more weight and whose facts are true."

This year's EC has resurrected the President's Council, which includes the presidents of each of the student organizations, if they are not already on the senate. It's Gibbs' job to oversee that body, as well as the executive council.

"We've been trying to concentrate on some of the bigger projects—the ones where we can really make a difference," says Gibbs. SGA has a \$90,000 budget, and much of their meeting time is absorbed in sorting out the best ways to spend that money. Student organizations come to SGA for extra funding when project costs exceed their budgets, such as the College Democrats offering refreshments to the crowd during a recent candidate visit.

Under consideration at present are a project to purchase new furniture for the second floor lounge areas in the Wilson Center, as well as a conference table and a rolling whiteboard; pouring a concrete slab to replace the wooden stage and adding a pavilion and lights in the Grove; and adding more picnic tables around campus.

"We met with President West, who said he would like for there to be more student gathering spaces around campus, and that's exactly what we would like, as well," says Gibbs.

As the student leaders on campus, these five women create the spaces and the environment in which students' voices are heard and their needs and concerns are addressed.

"It's hard to realize that you're really making a difference," says Gaston, "but as we talk about all of these things, we really have done a lot this year."

"It's tiring, it's exhausting, but it's worth it," adds Fleming.

All five women say they fell in love with Huntingdon immediately when they came for a visit. "It's the perfect amount of college," says **Justala Simpson '20**, SGA director of public relations. "We are small and quaint, but we have just enough of the fancier amenities. I love that everyone knows everyone. We're in a perfect location. We're a college, but we're a family, too."

"After my first tour, I knew I would call this place home," says **Sidney Carol Hall '19**, SGA treasurer. "I fell in love with the people I met and the feeling of family and community."

And their love for the campus hasn't diminished.

"It's even better now, because we get to play a part in what makes this place so special," says Gaston.

THE PRESIDENTIAL FELLOWS PROGRAM

Strategic Plan Theme I: Creating Experiential Enrollment Initiatives


Imagine that you're considering colleges on the merits of the academic and active learning experiences you'll gain. You don't play a sport with the intensity of participating in intercollegiate athletics, and band and cheerleading are not part of your college aspirations. You just want to learn and do. And you want to learn and do as much as possible—to be engaged, fully, in the living and learning experience that is offered at a residential undergraduate-focused college.

Look no further.

New for students entering in the fall of 2019 is the Presidential Fellows program, developed as part of the College's Building Great Lives strategic plan. The program, already recruiting students and under the direction of **Leanne Mallory '05**, the College's director of strategic initiatives since July 1, was designed to attract high-achieving student-leaders who want to be immersed fully in their college experience and who are not involved in other campus teams. The program encourages personal and professional devel-

opment, provides individual and collective networking and community-building, and promotes scholarship through academic colloquy and individual study. Participation includes a \$5,000 stackable scholarship awarded on top of selected Huntingdon Honors Scholarships and financial aid.

Mallory says the target group of students includes those who are academically strong, intellectually curious, excited about learning, and eager to serve. Minimum qualifications for acceptance into the Presidential Fellows program are an ACT of 23 and a 3.0 high school grade point average, whether the applicant is a prospective freshman or transfer student. The applicant should be accepted to the College simultaneously with or prior to applying to the program. To fill the initial Fellows spaces, there are three application deadlines, with the first participants selected after Dec. 1; the second group after Feb. 1; and the third group after April 1, if places remain. Presidential Fellows applications are submitted online, as are applications for admission.





The program fits not only with cohort-specific recruitment initiatives identified in the strategic plan, but also with the College's emphasis on vocational identification and exploration. Presidential Fellows will do far more than attend classes and listen to lectures. To deepen engagement in line with students' interests, each Fellow will identify an academic team in which s/he will participate for 10 hours each week. The teams include (but are not limited to):

- Ability First Team—working with peers through the College's Ability First (disability services) Resource Center or with community youth through the Huntingdon Ability Sport Network (youth wheelchair sport teams).
- Academic Mentoring Team—providing leadership, tutoring, and other academic guidance and support for students and/ or academic programs.
- Forensics/Debate Team—serving in or leading individual and team rhetorical events and preparing debaters for competition.

- Media Production/Social Media Team—recording and reporting college activities and events and creating content for College social media accounts.
- Sports Marketing and Broadcasting Team—promoting, recording, and reporting events and creating content for Huntingdon's NCAA-III teams' social media accounts.
- Student Technology Support Team—supporting instructional/ classroom technology initiatives for faculty and students.

• Undergraduate Science Research Team—participating in undergraduate research with faculty in the sciences and/or serving as faculty research assistants or lab assistants.

Each team will be coached by a member of faculty, working cooperatively with staff and other faculty in selected areas.

In addition, Fellows will participate in Student Affairs programming; complete annual service projects; complete a Capstone project; live in the College's on-campus residential community; fulfill general program requirements; and remain in good standing academically and in conduct. The program is renewable through graduation as long as the requirements are met, or for four years, whichever comes first. Because of the time commitment involved, the Presidential Fellows program is not open to students who will participate in intercollegiate athletic teams, band, or cheer.

Mallory, who completed a Master of Education degree in higher education administration at the University of Alabama, gathered extensive preparation for her new position by working with students and faculty in first-year experience and retention initiatives at UA. She also served as program coordinator for recruitment and training and as a residence coordinator for university housing at Florida State University.

"The Presidential Fellows Program will provide opportunities for participants not only to build and strengthen their academic skills, but also to build their resumes and portfolios for the future," says Mallory. "At the same time, Fellows will build friendships with their academic teams and coaches, be involved in the social life of the College, and live in community with other students in our residential village. Fellows is a unique program designed to complement the outstanding liberal arts curriculum that already exists here at Huntingdon. Participants will expand their abilities to think critically and ethically, to act with reason, and to grow in confidence for their future pursuits. And ...," she adds with a smile, "they'll have a whole lot of fun!"

BUILDING A VILLAGE

Strategic Plan Theme II: Strengthening the Physical Facilities

When Huntingdon's campus moved from Tuskegee to Montgomery in 1909, it settled into a space rough-drafted from farmland, accessible by dirt paths. Built around a central Green designed by Frederick Law Olmsted on 58 acres (give or take), the College grew, sometimes pushing across the boundary streets that formed to define it, but mostly remaining in that original designated space.

The 2001 purchase of the former Cloverdale School buildings and property, including athletic fields, allowed the campus to break across its northern boundary, Fairview Avenue.

So much happens when there's room to grow. The new Cloverdale Campus offered just the right space to construct Charles Lee Field, then W. James Samford Jr. Stadium, and to establish the Dr. Laurie Jean Weil Center for Teacher Education and Human Performance, James W. Wilson Jr. Gymnasium, Leo J. Drum Jr. Theater, a wrestling room, the Alice D. Reynolds Outdoor Volleyball Court, a physical therapy clinic operated by Pro-Impact Sports Medicine, and classrooms and offices for a variety of College programs. With the added facilities, cohort-specific recruitment for programs such as football, men's and women's lacrosse, men's wrestling, women's volleyball, and women's beach volleyball nearly doubled Huntingdon's enrollment from 2003 to 2015.

Several years ago, housing needs for the growing residential student population and a desire to offer more living choices that encourage students' journeys to independence led the College to purchase a few houses on College Court, across Fairview Avenue from the baseball field. These houses have become homes for Greek sororities and for upper-level students in other groups. To date, Huntingdon owns eight properties on College Court, but the newest housing opportunities don't end there.

This year, the College has purchased the former Richardson's Pharmacy and an adjacent building, the former Capitol Book & News property and an adjacent lot, two homes along the south side of Fairview near CB&N, and three apartment buildings on the north side of Fairview across from Bellingrath Hall.


The housing properties have been a need for many years. As students come to live on campus, they leave the more watchful surveillance of their parents and begin to breathe fresher air and to acquaint themselves with new freedoms. But there are still rules, made and enforced by others. As students spread their wings, they want more open space in which to fly—they long to make decisions about their own lives. Simultaneously, they become better prepared to live with the consequences of those decisions. That's what the journey to independence is about, and that's the type of living environment accommodated by off-campus housing that is still under the purview of the College, but that allows greater student autonomy.

Jordan Fleming '20, of Sheffield, Ala., lives in one of the houses on College Court. "Living off campus, but also being part of campus, gives you freedom," she says. "But it's freedom within boundaries. We still have room checks, we have security driving up and down the street and a security system on the house. It's safe, which was helpful when I told my mom about moving [into a neighborhood house], but it also gives you a sense of accountability and independence."

SGA President **Savannah Gibbs '20** agrees. "It's also helpful that we still have the meal plan, and we're only a short walk away from campus."

Recent improvements on the main campus have contributed to enrollment growth and enhanced student engagement, as well. During the last 15 years, generous gifts have made possible the George Gibbs Tennis Center; Roland Arena and Roland Student Center; Seay Twins Art Gallery; the Phyllis Gunter Snyder Center for Campus Ministries in Jackson Home; improvements to Smith Music Building and to the dining hall; and an expansion of Bellingrath Hall. Increased enrollment has funded the renovation of Ligon Hall, Trimble Hall, and a floor of Hanson Hall for campus housing. In 2018, a new Huntingdon Bands Rehearsal Hall opened in what once was the pool area of Roland Student Center, and the soccer and softball fields—shared space for decades—were finally made independent. The W. James Samford Jr. Soccer and Soft-

ball Complex opened for softball play last spring and for soccer play in fall 2018, complete with new scoreboards, a press box, and other amenities.

In less than two decades, Huntingdon has built a village.

Soon, improvements to Houghton Library will transform the entrance into the Caroline Slawson Campus Commons, adding classrooms, coffee, and academic offices. The College hopes to keep the library open 24 hours when classes are in session, providing a space where students may gather, study, discuss, and commune comfortably any time they wish.

The next step? Pending funding raised as part of the Building Great Lives capital campaign that supports the strategic plan initiatives, there are plans to develop a wellness center on the main campus, to include a competition-sized indoor pool, an outdoor recreation pool, 24-hour available cardio equipment, an indoor walking track, and an indoor climbing wall. This facility will provide a unique internship environment for students majoring in sport management, as well as providing wellness facilities for use by students, faculty, staff, alumni, and College neighbors. In addition, the College could expand athletic teams to add swimming and diving.

The College's newest homes and apartment buildings will be used for housing. The College bookstore, now known as the Scarlet and Grey Shop, will move to the Capitol Book & News building. The lot adjacent to CB&N will be used for parking. Plans for the former Richardson's Pharmacy and adjacent building are to be determined, and many possibilities, including third-party enterprises, are under consideration. As with the addition of the Cloverdale properties, the facilities acquired just this year open wide new prospects for the College's future.

As more properties become available along Fairview near campus, it is the College's intention to add them to the Huntingdon Village. After all, so much happens when you have room to grow.

EDUCATION WITH VISION

Strategic Plan Theme III: Placing Service to Students at the Center of All We Do

What's the purpose of an undergraduate education?

To expose a student to possibilities for his/her future? To learn from the past in hopes that knowledge will thwart future mistakes and stimulate future successes? To expand one's thinking, scope, skills, and talents to provide better intellectual tools or active wisdom that can be used as needed in the future? To facilitate professional pathways, job or graduate school success?

Truth be told, all of the above are true.

According to a 2011 Pew Research Center study, 47% believe the purpose of undergraduate education is to develop work-related skills and 39% believe it is to help a student grow personally and intellectually, while 12% think time should be devoted to both purposes.

The common denominator among all of these concepts is the future. The College's desire to equip students with an intellectual/ethical toolkit as they enter their professional lives led to the College's 2009 Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP), "ACT: The Art of Critical Thinking." ACT includes a junior-level course, Practicing the Art of Critical Thinking (PACT), as well as integrating critical thinking concepts across the core curriculum.

Under the College's accreditation guidelines from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools-Commission on Colleges, each college is required to have a plan (QEP) for improving its academic program, based on mission, as part of the accreditation review process. The plan must have student learning outcomes that are assessable, thereby showing their degree of success.

PACT course content covers consideration of vocational direction and ethical reasoning. The course description puts it this way:

"This course represents the culminating experience that pulls together the basic competencies and ideas introduced in core and distribution courses taken. Working with a common text, students will engage a variety of questions that focus on the role of higher education in helping students to continue to develop value systems for fuller participation in society.

This course is very broadly about vocation, and as such will tread a line between being about ethics—more abstract thinking about what constitutes goodness—and focusing on careers. This focus makes it unique at the College—we're looking at texts in a different way from any other class at Huntingdon: not, how are they complex or self-contradictory, or historically significant, but how are they directly relevant to your life?"

Virginia Gaston '20, of Guntersville, Ala., says, "PACT is a course that teaches you how to think and how to understand, not what to think. I saw my PACT teacher the other day and I told her, thank you so much for that class! In that class environment, I learned how to disagree respectfully, and how to voice my own opinions."

"PACT is about finding our own identities," says **Jordan Fleming** '20, of Sheffield, Ala. "I have talked with so many alums who have told me that they felt more advanced than others in their professions or in graduate school because the College prepares us so well."

Huntingdon's next 10-year accreditation review will occur in 2019. As the College looks toward that site visit and self-study, a team of faculty, staff, and students is considering what the 2019 QEP will encompass. At the same time, the College has just developed its five-year strategic plan with Theme III focused on "placing service to students at the center of everything we do."

With both objectives in mind, the College plans to develop further the Art of Critical Thinking, sharpening and deepening the QEP's critical thinking, ethical reasoning, and consideration of vocational calling, as well as extending the conversation in new components from the sophomore through the senior years.

President J. Cameron West has talked about vocational calling and ethical reasoning as integral to his core educational values since arriving at the College in 2003. The deepening of these concepts in the Huntingdon core curriculum further fulfills his vision of the connection between mind, heart, and spirit necessary for a complete undergraduate education. "When I talk about calling, I refer not only to my own experience of feeling called to ministry, and then to ministry through higher education, but also to the many stories related to me by friends, students, and col-

leagues about their own identification of professional purpose," says West. "But calling is coupled with the questions, 'What do I believe? What are my core values?' Only when one stops emulating the beliefs of others and begins acting with a conscious awareness of his or her own beliefs is s/he truly demonstrating that wisdom has been gained."



Gabrielle Daniels, Racial Justice Fel-

low at the Equal Justice Initiative, offered a PACT lecture, a discussion of vocation and calling, in October. The lecture series is supported by a NetVUE grant.

Part of the implementation of the curricular emphasis has depended on well-trained teachers, in addition to alert learners. In 2017, Huntingdon welcomed Dr. William Cavanaugh, a professor of political theology, economic ethics, and ecclesiology at DePaul University, as a guest lecturer for PACT and other College audiences on the topic "You Can't Be Anything You Want (And It's a Good Thing, Too)." He also met with faculty in a roundtable discussion during his visit. Cavanaugh's appearance was funded by a grant from NetVUE, the Network for Vocation in Undergraduate Education, an arm of the Council on Independent Colleges funded by the Lilly Foundation.

NetVUE also funded a fall 2018 PACT lecture by Gabrielle Daniels, Racial Justice Fellow at the Equal Justice Initiative, who spoke on the topic of vocation and calling, illustrating that the path between the two is almost never straight or clearly defined.

In November, Patrick Jagoda and Ashlyn Sparrow of Game Changer Chicago provided a two-day faculty workshop on the use of games to improve learning outcomes and to facilitate student success. "The work of Game Changer was interesting to us for four reasons," says **Dr. Tom Perrin**, associate provost and director of the QEP. "First, they create games in a variety of media. Second, they teach faculty to teach students to develop their own games, which can be tailored to the needs of a particular course. Third, their games need not take up a whole semester. Finally, their games are all about what happens when ethical issues meet everyday practice."

"If we had a crystal ball and could see the future for each student, that might make it easier for the College," says **Dr. Anna McEwan**, provost, "but that circumstance would be far less meaningful for the student. The pathways of vocational awareness and self-discovery can only be walked by the one wearing the walking shoes. And it's through those journeys that one makes the connections leading to the next step, and the next, and the next."



HUNTINGDON HAPPENINGS

- During the spring, faculty approved the introduction of three interdisciplinary minors: Environmental Studies, Global Studies, and Public Policy; as well as a revision in the interdisciplinary Women's Studies minor. Each minor requires completion of 18 hours of study.
- Summer class enrollments have taken a new twist: you don't even have to be here to take the class! The State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA) has been expanded to include all states except California and Massachusetts, so unless students live in or will be staying in one of those states, they can take many summer classes online, allowing them to spend their summers at the beach or home or wherever they had planned to be, and still earn credit toward graduation. The new online summer class offerings led to the largest summer enrollment in memory in 2018.
- The Faculty Tenure and Promotion Committee and Provost Anna McEwan granted faculty promotions effective for the 2018–2019 academic year. One of the Best -

Huntingdon gained a number of accolades from national ranking publications in 2018, beginning with recognition as one of the best colleges and universities in Alabama by College Consensus, a new college aggregator. The ranking shows that Huntingdon achieved the highest student approval ratings of any college in the state and ranks overall in the top three colleges and universities. Consensus rankings are based on a comprehensive aggregate of published rankings and verified student reviews. College Consensus followed this ranking with naming Huntingdon to their list of Best Small Colleges in America.

With the release of the 2019 U.S. News & World Report America's Best Colleges ranking list, Huntingdon climbed two spots to number 11 among Regional Colleges-South and is ranked sixth among Best Values in the region.

U.S. News' rankings evaluate colleges and universities on 16 measures of academic quality, allowing viewers to see at a glance the relative quality of U.S. institutions of higher learning. Other than subjective peer assessment and guidance counselor assessment scores, the rest of the data on which the ranking is based is hard, quantifiable, and objective. The most weight in a college's score is given to outcomes (35%), including social mobility—new for the 2019 ranking—which factors the school's success at graduating students who have the highest financial need, as judged by the student's eligibility to receive a Pell Grant.



Huntingdon's statistics in one category, in particular, are stellar: the College achieved the second highest alumni giving percentage among all regional colleges and universities in the country.

Huntingdon was also notified of inclusion on Washington Monthly's annual list of Colleges that Change Lives, and of designation as a Best College in the Region: Southeast, by the Princeton Review.

THE LATEST STATS: According to the College's official second-week report in the fall semester, 23 states (AL, AR, CA, FL, GA, ID, IL, IN, KS, KY, LA, MD, MI, MS, MO, NE, NC, OH, SC, TN, TX, VT, WI) and 5 countries (Belgium, Canada, Mexico, Venezuela, and the U.S.) are represented in Huntingdon's enrollment this year, with an overall head-count of 1,081, including day, evening, full- and part-time students. The student-faculty ratio is 14:1. Of the 878 students in the full-time day program, 555 live in campus housing. The largest majors are business administration and exercise science. Thirty-five percent of students declare ethnicity other than Caucasian, representing strong growth in diversity during the past two decades.





SELLERS AWARD: During Commencement Exercises, **Dr. Maureen Kendrick Murphy '78**, professor of chemistry and chair of the Department of Chemistry, was honored with the Julia Lightfoot Sellers Award for the third time in her tenure on the Huntingdon faculty. The award is given annually after selection by Huntingdon juniors and seniors to "that member of the teaching faculty who, in their judgment, has done much this year toward inspiring them to nobility of purpose and integrity of character, and rekindling within them a deeper desire for learning." Presenting the award was former Huntingdon trustee, the Honorable **Will Sellers**, associate justice on the Alabama Supreme Court and grandson of **Julia Lightfoot Sellers**, **Class of 1907**.




OUTSTANDING DISSERTATION: Dr. Blake Ball, assistant professor of history, received word in February that his doctoral dissertation had been recognized with the 2017 University of Alabama Outstanding Dissertation Award. His work, "Charlie Brown's America: Peanuts and the Politics of Wishy-Washy, 1950–1989," had been honored previously as the outstanding dissertation in UA's College of Arts and Sciences.

NURSING TRACK PROGRAM INTRODUCED: Huntingdon students have long been able to move on from their Huntingdon degrees to nursing programs across the state. Several have completed Certified Registered Nurse Practitioner licensure. With the demand for nurses high and the pathway having a strong precedent of success, Huntingdon faculty have developed a devoted Nursing Track program. Track courses include coursework in the biology major and required core courses that are compatible with health professions, totaling 92 hours. To complete the biology degree, students pepper in electives to reach the total 120 hours required for graduation. Dr. Erastus C. Dudley, chair of the Department of Biology and professor of biology, serves as the nursing adviser. Currently there are only eight CAPE-certified professionals in the state of Alabama, of which Huntingdon College professor Dr. Lisa Olenik Dorman is one. CAPE certification requires three years of experience teaching students who have disabilities and passing the APENS examination.

- Biochemistry Program Achieves ASBMB Accreditation **-**

Huntingdon's biochemistry program has long been well-regarded by employers and graduate and professional schools, but a new accreditation will make the futures of biochemistry graduates shine even brighter. In January 2018, the College was notified that the Huntingdon biochemistry program had achieved national accreditation from the American Society for Biochemistry and Molecular Biology for a full seven-year term, through Oct. 14, 2024.

ASBMB has accredited college biochemistry and molecular biology programs at nearly 70 colleges, but Huntingdon is the only college in Alabama to have achieved this accreditation. ASBMB accreditation criteria include assessment of the program's curriculum, research opportunities for students, faculty training, and learning infrastructure. To have their degrees certified, biochemistry graduates must pass an assessment instrument provided by the ASBMB.



In issuing Huntingdon's accreditation, the biochemistry program was noted for: a rich and interdisciplinary curriculum; encouragement of students to pursue independent research; faculty working to ensure quality teaching, mentorship, and research experiences; and adequate course offerings for students within the program.

Huntingdon's primary accrediting body is the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges. ASBMB, based in Rockville, Md., is a national, major-specific accreditation in addition to SACSCOC accreditation.



SKILLS AND SMILES: The Department of Sport Science and Physical Education continued its partnership with special education students at three local elementary schools in 2018. Through the program, the elementary students come to Huntingdon five times each semester for one-hour skills clinics with Huntingdon students in the College's Adapted Physical Education class.



- Farewell to a Legend -

Coach Buzz Phillips, athletic director emeritus and long-time coach for Huntingdon, announced his retirement in November. Phillips has spent 25 of the past 28 years at Huntingdon, serving as an assistant baseball coach (1991–1996), helping to restart the men's basketball program and taking the team to the National Small College Athletic Association championship; serving as director of athletics (2004–2013); and coaching the women's basketball program for 12 seasons. The women's team has won 186 games since the beginning of their NCAA-III era in 2004, and Phillips has been at the helm for 164 of those wins. As the 2018 season began, he was on medical leave. Paige Huff '08 has been named interim head women's coach.

"Coach Phillips has had a significant and positive impact on me during the past 25 years," Huntingdon head baseball coach **D.J. Conville '98** said. "He recruited me here from junior college in the spring of 1994 when he was the assistant baseball coach. Since then, I have had the pleasure of playing for him, working for him, and working alongside him. He is first class. He is a wonderful friend, and he has always been great to me. I truly appreciate the impact he has had on me."

Huntingdon Director of Athletics **Mike Turk** said Phillips made a lasting impact on Huntingdon—an impact that isn't just judged by wins and losses, but on lives touched. "I want to personally thank Buzz for all he has done for Huntingdon College, and also for me," said Turk. "Buzz is a large part of the reason I came to Huntingdon 15 years ago. He has touched many lives during his time here as a coach, athletic administrator, mentor, and friend to all who came in contact with him. I am thankful for our time together and I know Huntingdon College is a better place because of Buzz Phillips' time here."

"From the time I entered Huntingdon as a freshman in 2011 until I graduated, Coach Buzz became more than just my coach. He became my family," said **Pat Pickens** '15, the Lady Hawks' all-time leading scorer. "It saddens me that the time has come for his retirement because I know of his love for the game of basketball. We made history together, we laughed, we cried, and we overcame obstacles together. As a freshman, my goal was to earn his trust and once I did that, my goal became to always keep his trust. I played my heart out for him every single game. He was a great coach, and he is an amazing human being."

"As much success as we've had on the court, seeing these players go on to success after basketball is what is really satisfying," said Phillips. "Getting a young person in here as a freshman and seeing them develop as a player, as a student, and as a person so they can be successful in life, that's what really counts."

The College's fieldhouse is named in Coach Phillips' honor.

FOOTBALL

The Hawks football team struggled to a 4-5 record in the 2018 season but closed the year winning 4 of 5 games. Despite the rough season, head coach **Mike Turk** and the Hawks reached a milestone with the program's 100th career win. Three coaches (Turk, **Steven Hicks**, and **Charlie Goodyear**) have been a part of all 100 wins. Among the

highlights of the season, kicker **Chase Young '19** set the USA South Athletic Conference career record for field goals and points scored and linebacker **Trey Hayes '19** became Huntingdon's all-time leading tackler.

VOLLEYBALL

Coach Latonia Allen Brady's volleyball team earned one of its best seasons of the NCAA era in 2018, finishing with a 21-12 record and ending the season in the USA South Tournament quarterfinals. This was



the first 20-win season for the Hawks since 2005 and marked the third consecutive year Huntingdon has reached the conference tournament. **Amy Tyma '21** became the first volleyball player to earn first-team All-Conference honors since the Hawks joined the conference in 2013. Tyma also earned first-team West Division honors in both 2017 and 2018. Joining Tyma on the West Division team were **Alexis Creasman '19** (first-team), **Kaitlyn Carter '19**, and **Addison Genard '21** (both second-team).

SOCCER

The women's soccer team earned a return trip to the USA South Tournament quarterfinals and finished the season with a 7-8-3 record under head coach **Matt Gill**. This was the third consecutive season the Lady Hawks have reached the conference tournament. The Lady Hawks

also won their first game in the new Samford Complex, defeating Oglethorpe 1-0 on Sept. 12. **Elena Guy '21** earned second-team West Division honors for a second straight season. The men's team finished with a 3-13-1 record. **Kelan LeBlanc '22** was named third-team All-Conference and is just the second men's player to earn All-Conference recognition.

CROSS COUNTRY

In its second season of competition since restarting the program in the fall of 2017, the Hawks fielded a full men's team and ran with one female runner. Under the guidance of first-year head coach



lan Layne '14, the Hawks competed in seven events and hosted the first home meet in program history. The Huntingdon College Invitational was held Sept. 8 at Greenbrier Track, a facility developed and maintained by Huntingdon College board of trustees chairman Dave Borden.

IN THE HAWKS' NEST

BASKETBALL

The Huntingdon women's basketball team reached the USA South Tournament for the second time and finished with a 16-10 record. Juliette Harp '18 became the second Lady Hawk to earn second-team All-South Region honors. Harp finished her career as a three-time All-Conference selection, earning first-team honors as a junior and senior. When the Lady Hawks' season ended, Harp led Division III with 24 double-doubles in 26 games. She became the first Lady Hawk



to reach 1,000 career points and 1,000 career rebounds and finished as the program's career leader in rebounds, blocks, and field goal percentage. Nine players earned Academic All-Conference honors. In his first full season as head coach, **Caleb Kimbrough** led the men's team to a nine-win improvement from the previous season. The Hawks finished with an 11-14 record and **Brandon McLean '18** earned honorable mention All-Conference honors. Seven Hawks were named to the Academic All-Conference team.

WRESTLING

The fourth-year Huntingdon wrestling program, under head coach **Craig Duncan**, turned in its most successful season, setting two program records with six head-to-head victories and a four-match winning streak



during the season. Huntingdon closed the season with its best performance yet in the NCAA Division III Lower Midwest Regional Tournament, winning 11 matches and scoring 22 points. To put those numbers in perspective, in their first three regional appearances combined, Huntingdon won nine matches and scored 21.5 points. **DeAndre Beck '18** (141 pounds) turned in Huntingdon's best regional finish, placing fifth. Beck was named a National Wrestling Coaches Association Scholar All-American for a second consecutive season and seven wrestlers earned Academic All-Conference honors.

BASEBALL

The Hawks baseball team reached 20 wins for the 13th time in 14 seasons under head coach **D.J. Conville '98** and returned to the USA South Tournament for a third straight season. The Hawks finished 22-18, closing the season with a three-game winning streak. Pitcher **Carden Mellown '20** earned second-team All-Region honors and utility player **Taylor Fought '18** was named third-team All-Region. In the



USA South, Fought earned first-team All-Conference honors and Mellown, **Joseph Calvert '18, Will Cosby '19**, and **Wes Powell '20** were each named second-team All-Conference; with 14 players named Academic All-Conference.



GOLF

The Huntingdon men's golf team turned in another strong season, earning a No. 2 ranking in Division III for the majority of the season and tying for 11th in the NCAA Men's Golf Championship. Despite the standing, the Hawks' four-round total of 1189 in the national tournament was better than the Hawks' runner-up score in 2016 and fourth-place score in 2017, and was the program's third best four-round total

during the NCAA era. The Hawks placed fifth or better in 10 of their 11 tournaments and third or better in nine events. Five Hawks (Mark Connelly '19, Henry Gee '19, Drew Mathers '20, Stephen Shephard '19, and Jon Colten Standland '18) earned tournament wins. Connelly and Shephard were named second-team All-America and Standland was an honorable mention All-America. All three were named to the All-Region team, with Connelly and Stanaland being Academic All-America Scholars. At the conference level, Connelly and Shephard were first-team All-Conference selections, Stanaland was a second-team selection, and Mathers was honorable mention. Eight men's golfers earned Academic All-Conference honors and the team was recognized by the Golf Coaches Association of America with a Team Academic Award. On the women's side, the Lady Hawks earned the second team win and second individual win (Vanessa Leiterman '19) in the program's 10-year history with a dominant performance in the Rhodes Women's Golf Spring Invitational. During the Rhodes tournament, Anna Beth Harris '21 also made her mark with the second hole-in-one in program history. Three women's golfers earned Academic All-Conference honors.

SOFTBALL

The Huntingdon softball team made its debut in the new Samford Complex, put together a winning season, and returned to the USA South Tournament for a fifth straight season. Under second-year head coach Casey Chrietzberg '09, the Lady Hawks finished 21-20 for the first winning season since 2015. Huntingdon picked up the first victory in its new facility on Feb. 15 with a 4-3 win over Belhaven. Four players earned recognition from the USA South. Alyssa Singleterry '19 led the conference in hits and was named first-team West Division; Rayne Ellis '19, Madison Hunt '20, and McKenzie Ridgway '19 were each named second-team West Division; and 13 players were named Academic All-Conference.



TENNIS

The Huntingdon women's tennis team earned its second most winning season in the NCAA era, gave head coach **Ximena Moore** her 200th career victory, and returned to the USA South



Tournament for a fifth consecutive season. The Lady Hawks reached the conference tournament semifinals for the third time in five seasons, ending with a 17-3 record, one win short of the program's NCAA-era record of 18. With a 6-3 win over Covenant on March 30, Moore earned her 200th win with the program. In 16 seasons, Moore has earned 14 consecutive winning seasons and is the Lady Hawks' all-time winningest coach with a record of 203-97. Josie Waddell '19 was named first-team All-Conference—the first Lady Hawk recognized with this honor since Huntingdon joined the USA South— and first-team West Division. Zoya Robinson '20 and Heather Tabor '19 were each named second-team West Division, and Caroline McBroom '18 finished her career with 53 singles, 51 doubles, and 104 total victories. During Huntingdon's NCAA era, McBroom ranks third in each career category. Five Lady Hawks were named Academic All-Conference and all five were chosen as ITA Scholar-Athletes, with the team chosen as an ITA All-Academic Team for the 13th time since 2004. On the men's side, the Hawks finished with a 7-10 record and just missed a trip to the conference tournament. Adam Self '20 was named honorable mention West Division and three Hawks earned Academic All-Conference honors.

LACROSSE

The men's lacrosse team marked its most successful season in its seven-year history, setting a program record for wins, capturing the inaugural USA South Athletic Conference championship, and advancing to the NCAA Tournament for



the first time. The Hawks tallied a 16-3 record, went undefeated in conference play, and enjoyed program-record six-game winning streaks twice during the season. Andrew Carey was named USA South Coach of the Year and Sam Hitt '19 was named USA South Player of the Year. In addition to Hitt, Kendrick Ballard '18 and Adrian Harper '19 were named first-team All-Conference, Bryce Coates '21 and Matt Murphy '19 were named second-team All-Conference, and eight Hawks earned Academic All-Conference honors. Murphy was named MVP of the USA South Tournament and Hitt, Coates, Ballard, Zach Barnhill '20 and Austen Saucier '19 were named to the All-Tournament team. With a limited number of returning players, the sixth-year women's lacrosse team finished with a 2-12 record. Seven Lady Hawks earned Academic All-Conference honors.

BEACH VOLLEYBALL


The second-year beach volleyball program won three matches, including the program's first win against a Division II team. Playing a schedule that consisted of just two Division III teams, the Hawks' competition primarily consisted of NCAA Division I and Division II

programs and NAIA programs. Huntingdon beat Division III Principia twice during the season, including the first 5-0 victory in Huntingdon history. The Hawks beat Division II Carson-Newman for the third win of the season. The team produced eight Academic AII-Conference selections.

Having fun on Charlie's Bunion in the Great Smoky Mountains

The Appalachian Trail begins in Amicalola Falls, Ga., and ends at the top of Mt. Katahdin in Maine, covering 14 states and 2,190.9 miles. Thru-hiking the trail—hiking the entire trail in one go—can take five to seven months to complete, during which every weather condition must be endured. It's a tough journey. In 2017, 4,224 people attempted to thruhike the trail, but only 25% completed it.

Rick Yates '82, a retired IT executive, had thought about hiking sections of the trail for years. When his friend, Mike Davis, said in December 2017 that he was planning a thru-hike, Rick says, "That was just the spark I needed to get out there and go for it." Rick's wife, **Lisa**

Sells Yates '83, says she championed his decision, never realizing what a personal journey she was about to begin in her own right.

Their adventures began March 17, 2018. At first, Rick planned just to complete a section of the trail and be gone for about 40 days. Lisa traveled from their home near Atlanta to visit Rick and Mike at a stop in Gatlinburg about three weeks into the trip. "I could see the excitement in Rick's eyes,

hear the passion in his voice and the exciting stories from the hike so far," says Lisa. "Everything I heard and saw stuck with me." On their next phone visit, she encouraged him to finish what he'd started—to follow his personal yellow rocky-brick road.

"Now I had to get in the right headspace, realizing that my best friend would be gone for the next five-and-a-half months," says Lisa.

Rick and Mike settled into a daily routine: rise early, hike three hours, break, hike two to three more hours, afternoon lunch break, hike three hours and finish the day. "When possible, we tried to take our breaks at some scenic spot on the trail," says

Rick. "Some of my favorite memories are the simple times of rest during a break and breathing in the beauty. One afternoon, we had completed a long climb up a mountain and found a perfect ledge to sit on and take our lunch break. It was so quiet. We had a long view of the valley as an afternoon thunderstorm was slowly approaching. We sat on the ledge and listened to the wind, to the thunder roll across the valley, smelled the rain as it approached. It was a gift."

"I think the most significant change I had was gaining the knowledge, through experience, that I can survive with very little," Rick continues. "For example, I can live with only basic needs being met, I can overcome daily body pains, I can deal with rain for days on end, I can push through the

cold, I can find a place to sleep in almost any setting, I can overcome fears, etc. I survived six months carrying everything I need to live on my back."

Meanwhile, Lisa, who had married Rick at age 21, learned she could overcome obstacles she'd never faced before, as well. "Just

"Things started breaking, leaking, squeaking, and falling apart in the house, yard, and car." She faced the deaths of two friends, a family member's cancer diagnosis, and her uncle's hospice care. There were happy, wish-you-were-here-to-share-this moments, as well. Their daughter (Kath-ryn Yates Williams '09) and

son-in-law began selling crops at their new farm after months of hard work. Their son announced his engagement. Just as Rick enjoyed the beauty of the trail and of creation all around him, Lisa says, "life can bring renewal, promise, brightness and exciting challenges." She, too, took notice of quiet time and learned to meditate and do yoga. "I learned how to just be and find contentment in being."

Rick found new self-knowledge in his drift away from daily pressures. "The longer you are on the trail and disconnected from the normal fast pace of our lives, the more aware you become of the nature, wildlife, and beauty around you. You become more connected to the earth. So you find yourself stopping just to watch trees sway or fog lift on a lake, listen to squirrel chatter or a birdsong, smell pine or rhododendron, taste wild raspberries or fresh spring water," says Rick.

He also found camaraderie in the trail community. "The community of hikers on the trail is really beautiful. It's an eclectic blend of people from different age groups, states, countries, and life experiences all working toward a common goal. It is not competitive—it is supportive. That is rare these days. We didn't talk so much about the things that separate us, but about the things we have in common. The shared goal of the trail bound us together in a special way.

"Another very memorable experience was the final day of the hike. We awoke early to climb Mt. Katahdin, the last mountain of our hike. At 6:20 a.m. we began the 5.3 mile hike from our campsite to the peak, with over 4,100 feet of elevation gain in just a three-mile stretch. It was the most technically challenging climb of the trail, but all of our trail experience had prepared us for that day. The weather was perfect. As we climbed above the tree line, we saw the stunning Maine wilderness around us, and the sun gleaming on nearby mountains. Our emotions were intense and spilling over. Reaching the summit sign on Mt. Katahdin was the culmination of almost six months of hiking. It was an amazing joy and sense of accomplishment."

Lisa and their son, Connor, met Rick at the airport. "We got back to our house, where I had made white blazes [the way the A.T. is marked] and put them from our driveway, up the walkway, to the front door! I made a sign saying, 'The GA to ME A.T. thru-hike officially ends here!' Just by pure chance, almost all of our neighbors were arriving home from work and school and greeted him with big hugs and congratulations. It was special and we couldn't have timed it any better!"

Lisa quotes wisdom learned from her cousin, "We sometimes can't see what our energy is being saved for until we go through the growing hours."

Lisa concludes, "Whatever trail you might be blazing, give yourself grace. Don't take each day for granted. Do the hard stuff. Don't settle for anything but the best and remember the best doesn't come overnight. If you need help, ask. There are experiences to learn from by tackling them alone. There

are relationships to be renewed, ... to be formed, ... to be found that never existed until you're out there in your own wilderness."



After graduating from Huntingdon, Mary Ann Jenkins '53 of Moulton, Ala., completed a master's degree in social work at the University of Alabama. In 1966, Mary Ann created a will, leaving half of her estate to Huntingdon and half to the University of Alabama. Mary Ann died in 2014. She had never married and had no children. Unaware of a will, her



family found her estate wishes while cleaning out her home. Unlike others who have left lasting gifts to the College, Mary Ann was a lost contact in the Huntingdon alumni database. We wish she could have heard our heartfelt thanks for her generous legacy gift.

- Huntingdon Dedicates New Soccer/Softball Complex

Although soccer and softball have been part of Huntingdon College's athletic teams for nearly 30 years, the teams have not enjoyed separate spaces on campus. Now, with the dedication of the W. James Samford Jr. Soccer and Softball Complex, each sport has its own field for practice and play, as well as new lockers, restrooms, and an indoor press box. The softball field was dedicated March 24, while the soccer field was dedicated Sept. 8. The stadium and fields were made possible by a gift from the W. James Samford Jr. Foundation.

Huntingdon trustee **Lucinda Samford Cannon**, sister to W. James (Jimmy) Samford Jr.; her cousin, Preston Barnett; and her son, Race Cannon, were instrumental in making the gift to the College that served as a catalyst for the refurbishment of the shared fields. Construction began during the 2016–2017 academic year and continued well into the 2017–2018 academic year.

"Our participation in NCAA-Division III athletics has provided a tremendous infusion of students into our college community—students who would not have come here without the opportunity to continue playing the sports they played in middle-and high school," said Huntingdon President J. Cameron West. "Our athletic events unify our campus community, provide a portal for the Cloverdale and River Region communities to support Huntingdon, and create connections and memories that our student-athletes will carry with them forever. We are so grateful for this gift, which has made it possible to provide dedicated fields and facilities for the men and women who play soccer and for the women who play softball."

Jimmy Samford, raised in Opelika and educated at Auburn University, was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force and served three years, then returned to higher education, completing his law degree at the University of Alabama. From 1980 until his death in 2003, Samford lived just a few blocks away from the Huntingdon campus, continuing a legacy of relationship between the Samford family and the College that dates back to the College's founding in Tuskegee. Two ancestors were instrumental in steering the College through times of growth and expansion, including Samford's

great-great grandfather, William Flewellen Samford, who raised funds to expand the residence halls at Tuskegee Female College (Huntingdon's earliest identity) in 1856. Both of Samford's and Cannon's grandmothers attended Tuskegee Female College. Cannon has also continued the family's close connection to the College as a long-standing member of the Huntingdon board of trustees.

"Multiple major gifts over the years by the W. James Samford Jr. Foundation have propelled Huntingdon athletics into the NCAA era with great momentum, including the construction of our football and lacrosse stadium on the Cloverdale campus, which bears Jimmy Samford's name," said West. Huntingdon's School of Business and Professional Studies is also named in Samford's memory.




