Did you know that Huntingdon Hawks Football is one of only 12 NCAA Division III football programs in the country, out of almost 250, that has earned a berth in the 32-school national playoffs four of the last five years?

Nenigne, RARE, DISTINCTIVE, New

Huntingdon students, when asked what they believe is unique, rare, or distinctive about the Huntingdon experience, overwhelmingly cite the family-like atmosphere and the relationships formed among students, faculty, and staff. Because of its size, people can be known at Huntingdon, and therefore the energy and essence they contribute becomes the lifeblood of the institution.

Still, beyond Huntingdon's people there are aspects of the College that aren't replicated elsewhere (unique); or don't occur often in the higher education landscape (rare); or that are done especially well in comparison to other colleges (distinctive). There are also some exciting new facets of Huntingdon life introduced this academic year. Here are a few stand-out points in the Huntingdon story.



Huntingdon Plan travel/study, part of the Plan since its beginning, has taken students to Australia, Austria, Belize, Canada, the Caribbean, China, Costa Rica, Ecuador, England, France, Germany, Greece, Honduras, Iceland, Ireland, Israel and the Holy Lands, Kenya, Mexico, New Zealand, Northern Ireland, Panama, Puerto Rico, Scotland, Trinidad, Turkey, and many parts of the U.S., including numerous trips to Alaska and Hawaii. Without fail, graduates praise Huntingdon travel-study as one of their most transformative educational experiences. During 2019–2020, trips include Hawaii, Ireland, Australia, and Prague and Vienna. THE HUNTINGDON PLAN

At Huntingdon, students are part of a living and learning community where every undergraduate has equal access to the tools and experiences that heighten student success in and beyond college. Through the Huntingdon Plan, introduced in 1996, traditional undergraduate students are provided **books and information resources** for fall and spring terms; four-year use of a **laptop computer** (the student's to keep at graduation); senior year **travel-study** opportunities; and **active learning** in each major—all within regular tuition and fees and all within a community where students can **know and be known.**

THE CAMPUS

Huntingdon's beautiful campus was carved out of a field on the edge of the capital city, designed in 1908 by Frederick Law Olmsted Jr., who had planned the landscapes for the Boston Park System and the Biltmore Estate. John Jefferson Flowers Memorial Hall (1909), designed by H. Langsford Warren of England, founder of the School of Architecture at Harvard University, set the Gothic architectural style for the campus, modeled after buildings at Oxford and Cambridge. The purchase of the former Cloverdale School building and grounds in 2001 expanded the campus across Fairview Avenue, and the acquisition of more than a dozen properties—including the former Richardson's Pharmacy and Capitol Book & News buildings—on nearby streets has married the campus with surrounding neighborhoods, forming the Huntingdon Village.

THE HUNTINGDON VILLAGE

During the past five years, Huntingdon has purchased a number of homes and apartments near the campus, expanding housing options for upper-level students. In the fall of 2020, Huntingdon will institute a four-year residential policy, requiring students to live in Huntingdon housing unless they live with a parent or guardian within 45 miles of campus. Statistically, students who live on campus are more likely to be involved in their college experience and more likely to persist through graduation.

INTERCOLLEGIATE WRESTLING IN ALABAMA

Huntingdon's intercollegiate wrestling program, introduced in 2014, remains the only college-level program in Alabama and one of only a few in the Southeast.

ORACLE

RARE

A FOCUS ON UNDERGRADUATE EDUCATION

For 165 years, Huntingdon's teaching, staffing, student life programming, and resources have fed and funded students in their quest for undergraduate education. While the College will introduce graduate programs in the coming years, the primary mission will remain as shepherds for undergraduate learning.

THE MARCHING SCARLET & GREY

Huntingdon's Marching Scarlet & Grey—the only conference marching band that travels—was the first and remains the largest in the USA South Athletic Conference. Each band member receives a scholarship, uniforms, and a new instrument (his/hers to keep at graduation), with no fee required for participation. Auxiliaries include the Hawkettes (majorettes), Color Guard (flag line), and, beginning in fall 2020, a dance line. Entering its fourteenth year with a new director, **Dr. Rusty Logan**, the band has birthed the Huntingdon Winds Concert Band, Huntingdon Jazz, and BallHawks Pep Band. Many band members also participate in the College's Concert Choir and vocal ensembles.

RELATIONSHIP WITH THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

Huntingdon College's Methodist church threads were entwined in the fiber of its founding, and those threads have only strengthened during its 165 years. A member of the Alabama-West Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church, the bishops of the AWFC and the North Alabama Conference serve on the board of trustees, and **President J. Cameron West** is an ordained elder in full connection with the church. A quick scroll through the AWFC clergy list reveals dozens of Huntingdon alumni who answered the call to ministry while they were Hawks, two of whom are giving back through ministry outreach at HC: the Rev. **Rhett Butler '13**, chaplain, and the Rev. **Macon Armistead '14**, director of the Huntingdon Leadership Academy, a summer program for high school students who feel called to ministry vocations.

MISSION & MOTTO

FACULTY PRECEPT: GOOD TEACHING

The "publish or perish" mantra for faculty in large universities has no place at Huntingdon, where the measure of excellence among faculty is good teaching as assessed by faculty peers and leaders and by students.

TEACHER EDUCATION

Of all of the fields Huntingdon graduates populate, there are perhaps more teachers than any other profession. Hundreds of Huntingdon alumni teach at every level in the U.S. and abroad—and that number doesn't count alumni who teach as an avocation, lending their service as coaches and camp directors, Sunday school teachers, youth program leaders ... the list is long and uplifting. Teacher education programs have been part of Huntingdon's academic offerings since the College's earliest days. Today, Huntingdon educator preparation programs include elementary/collaborative special education; secondary education or secondary/collaborative special education in biology, chemistry-general science, English language arts, history, history-general social studies, or mathematics; P–12 music education (choral or instrumental); and P–12 physical education.

For many years, Huntingdon Adapted Physical Education students have worked with special needs children from selected area schools, teaching basic skills and movements for improving their lives.

DISTINCTIVE

STATON CENTER FOR LEARNING ENRICHMENT

The Staton Center for Learning Enrichment, in new office spaces on the second floor of Houghton Library, offers three devoted staff members and a number of students who serve as peer academic coaches to smooth the rough spots of academic life. Writing assistance, tutoring, time management, vocational discernment, and friendly advice are among the beacons offered by the Staton Center.

CENTER FOR CAREER AND VOCATION

Run by one-woman powerhouse **Sherry Leigh Lacey Farquhar '13**, the Center for Career and Vocation offers myriad programs that connect students with vocational opportunities through job fairs, road trips, workshops, networking gatherings, luncheons, individual help with resume writing and interviewing skills, and group information sessions.


MEN'S GOLF

Without question, golf is the most storied sport at Huntingdon, having driven their way into 30 national tournaments (19 NAIA and 11 NCAA-III), and earning six NAIA national championships, one NAIA and two NCAA-III national runner-up finishes, two NAIA and one NCAA-III national third-place finishes, and two NCAA-III national fourth-place finishes—not to mention the number of individual champions and successful professional players and coaches who have come from the program, introduced in 1959. Since 1982, the golf team has been ranked among the top teams nationally almost every year in either NAIA (until 2004) or NCAA-III (since 2005). In 2017, the three NCAA national coaches of the year were all graduates of Huntingdon's program: Division I Coach Scott Limbaugh '03, at Vanderbilt University; Division II Coach Steve Fell '87 at the University of West Florida; and Division III Coach Dave Schrever '89, at Huntingdon.

THE SCIENCES

Biology and Cell Biology

Alabama provides treasures just waiting to be researched. A large number of rare and endangered plant and animal species and wide biodiversity contribute to a biological wonderland for student researchers, so Huntingdon's biology programs take students into the Alabama landscape frequently. An interdisciplinary minor in environmental studies was introduced last year. As part of Huntingdon's membership in the Alabama Marine Environmental Sciences Consortium, students may earn a minor in marine science through summer study at Dauphin Island Sea Lab.

Chemistry and Biochemistry

Huntingdon students majoring in chemistry or biochemistry complete undergraduate research as part of their major requirements. Their research has made it possible for students to qualify for fellowships with Merck, the DOE Nuclear Summer School Program, and National Science Foundation Summer REU programs. Huntingdon's biochemistry major earned professional accreditation from the American Society for Biochemistry and Molecular Biology in 2018.

Exercise Science and Sport Studies

The sciences extend, also, to the sport sciences. Huntingdon's programs are respected in Alabama as being at the forefront of disability sport and training for professionals working with populations who have special needs. Active learning through Adapted Physical Education classes and/or work with Huntingdon's Red Wings wheelchair sport teams (for community youth who have physical disabilities) engages many students. Students may also enhance their resumes through work in the College's on-campus ProImpact Sports Medicine and Physical Therapy clinic.

Pre-Health Professions

Huntingdon's science faculty have formed a Pre-Health Professions Committee, which reviews and monitors the progress of students who intend to enter professional schools after graduating. Track programs in athletic training, dentistry, medicine, nursing, occupational therapy, optometry, pharmacy, physical therapy, and veterinary medicine suggest courses that meet professional school prerequisites, and PHPC members provide advice on interviewing, test preparation, and the professional admission process. Students who meet the requirements and guidelines of the PHPC may receive letters of recommendation from the committee.

These aspects of Huntingdon academic life, combined with stellar faculty, contribute to producing science graduates who are well-prepared for graduate or professional school placement or for gaining employment in their fields.





PRESIDENTIAL FELLOWS

Intellectual curiosity fueled by active learning form the core directives for Huntingdon's newest group of scholars: the Presidential Fellows. Selected from applicants achieving high school grade point averages of 3.0 or better and ACT composites of at least 23, 25 Presidential Fellows entered in fall 2019, each involved in one of seven academic teams: Ability First; Academic Mentoring; Forensics/Debate; Media Production; Sports Marketing; Technology; or Undergraduate Research. Engagement through student life programming, service, and completing a Capstone Project are among other commitments. The fellowship carries a \$5,000 scholarship that may be stacked with some Huntingdon academic awards. In turn, Fellows flourish in the art of learning while developing their skills, experience, and resumes for life after college.

The group arrived early for fall semester, spending a day on retreat bonding with each other and with their team coaches (faculty members) and six sophomore peer mentors. Periodic meetings with program director Leanne Mallory Carroll '05 for sessions on time management, personality and aptitude testing, college involvement, and other topics stoke student success.

"The work of the Presidential Fellows program reminds me of Proverbs 27:17," says mentor **Anna Nutting '22** of Montgomery. "As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another.' Each Fellow is offered a niche for developing his or her talents,

which in turn strengthens our community. When they are not participating on their teams, they immerse themselves in all facets of the campus."

"The [Presidential Fellows] program is outstanding and is enhancing the professional and personal skills of the students in their first year of college," says **Dr. Maureen Kendrick Murphy** '78, professor of chemistry. Dr. Murphy and professor **John Berch** '98 coach the research team, which is analyzing metal content in exotic orchids. "They made some discoveries that have never been reported in the research literature," says Dr. Murphy, who plans for Fellows to present their work at a professional conference in spring 2020.

Christopher Mayer '23, a political science major from Bennington, Vt., chose the Forensics/Debate Team because of his desire for a career in law and politics. The team requires students to stay up-to-date on current issues and to formulate speeches based on ways to address those issues. "Public speaking, critical thinking, academic writing, and professional research skills are critical for being successful on our team," says Chris. "[The PF] program benefits the College because [it is based on] positive educational work. It also betters the students because we are able to do more with our interests." The Forensics/Debate team began competing in tournaments this fall, receiving high rankings, praise, and awards from judges.



AaLeah Scott '23, of Montgomery, Ala., is a member of the Sports Marketing Team. An exercise science major who plans to earn a doctorate in physical therapy after graduating, AaLeah chose her team because, though not directly related to her major, her work helps her learn a different aspect of sports. "Being a part of the PF program has helped me make new friends and feel more comfortable as I transitioned from high school to college," says AaLeah. "I consider our group as one big family. I love that Huntingdon is small in size and community-oriented."

In some cases, Fellows are performing work equivalent to staff positions for the College. **Jacob Holston '23** serves as a technology fellow and was responsible for readying an electronic attendance system as fall classes began, requiring the installation of imaging devices, wiring buildings, testing, and troubleshooting.

Sophomore mentors provide guidance and friendship to the Fellows and say they're also benefiting from the program. "The transition into college is very exciting, but can also be a scary, stressful time," says mentor **Amelia Blair '22** of Montgomery. "We are there to provide a built-in community [as well as] advice from people who were just in their shoes last year. We attend the PF meetings, share meals in the

dining hall, share stories of our first year at Huntingdon, provide life advice and study tips, and even take spontaneous trips to get milkshakes!"

"I have grown in my leadership skills by being a mentor," says **Colby Hutson '22** of Cullman, Alabama. "I love knowing I am making an impact in someone's life and always welcome the opportunity to help make someone feel at home."

"The Fellows program has been an amazing addition to Huntingdon College," says Amelia. "They have been eager to serve others, to be involved, and to challenge themselves academically. They have offered their gifts and talents for the benefit of our school and have done it with grateful hearts."

Because of the time demands, Fellows program participation is reserved for those who are not part of an athletic team, cheerleading, or band—but Fellows have a team of their own, forming camaraderie through a common goal. **Kurt Kraft '23**, a communication studies major and music minor from Enterprise, Ala., is participating in the Media Production team. "I find a new reason to enjoy my time here each and every day," says Kurt. "The school is great, the people are greater, and the atmosphere is like no other."

MASTER OF ATHLETIC TRAINING PROGRAM

A milestone was reached this year as Huntingdon began the planning process for introducing the College's first graduate program. Once approved, the new Master of Athletic Training program will prepare students for careers in allied health care, with skills involving injury prevention and evaluation, emergency care, treatment and rehabilitation, and organizational administration in a sports or active population environment.

Huntingdon discontinued admission to its undergraduate program in athletic training several years ago, knowing that licensure was moving to the graduate level. With the new national graduate-level licensure requirement enforced, Huntingdon's graduate program could be among the first such programs in the state.

Dr. Jennifer Ballard, assistant professor of athletic training, is working with a team of athletic training leaders to develop the curriculum and to plan the structure and staffing needed to support the program.

Offering a graduate program requires submission and approval of a level change proposal to SACSCOC (Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges). The planning team will also seek approval through the Commission on Accreditation of Athletic Training Education (CAATE), through which specialized accreditation for the College's former undergraduate athletic training program was granted.

UNDERGRADUATE CRIMINAL JUSTICE MAJOR

In response to student demand, Huntingdon began a new undergraduate major in criminal justice in fall 2019. The program, headed by former FBI agent **Dr. Lou Harris**, combines practice with theory. Study includes the causes of crime, an understanding of the interdependence of the branches of the criminal justice system, constitutional law and its application, moral and ethical perspectives of law and justice, criminal investigation, and forensics.



CALLING, VOCATION, AND ETHICS

Since his arrival in 2003, **President J. Cameron West** has captained a directive and a deep commitment to helping students develop a stronger sense of what they are called to do with their lives. In 2015, the College became a charter member of the Network for Vocation in Undergraduate Education (NetVUE), and subsequently piloted a core course on the subject of vocation, the junior-level Leading Lives that Matter. With the 2019–2020 academic year, that course has expanded to two courses with activities and groups surrounding dual foci on vocation and ethics.

Sophomore Year Is Calling

During the sophomore year, students take the one-credit-hour course, Introduction to Ethics and Vocation (CALL 200). As the semester begins, students gather for Sophomore Year Is Calling, a day devoted to vocational and ethical exploration. As students complete the CALL 200 course, they engage in meaningful reflection on the possibilities for their lives and career plans.

The Junior Year: Call 300

A junior-level two-credit course, CALL 300, Perspectives in Ethics and Vocation, further encourages students along the pathway toward the goal of living well.

THE CAROLINE SLAWSON CAMPUS COMMONS

Students were greeted with a new space for studying and gathering as fall semester began. Caroline Slawson Campus Commons, constructed at the entrance and in the first floor of Houghton Memorial Library, offers new study pods complete with lamps and footrests, comfortable chairs and tables, swivel desks, and 24/7 access for both residents and commuters. Continuing to the second floor, new furniture and a new classroom support individual and group study, and the Staton Center for Learning Enrichment has moved to the second floor, as well. "I love the new cubicles," says **Lucy Burch '21**. "They're perfect for studying, writing papers—just focusing. I get more done because they provide a more private study environment than open tables do." The project was funded by a generous gift from the Guice Slawson family.

THE PHYLLIS & GENE STANALAND HOUSE AT HUNTINGDON COLLEGE, AND THE SCARLET & GREY SHOP

Extensive renovation to the former Capitol Book & News building at 1140 East Fairview Avenue, across from the Cloverdale Campus and two blocks away from the main campus, involved gutting the inside of the building and refinishing it from toe to top while adding a wrap-around porch, a drive-through window, and parking areas. Renamed the Phyllis and Gene Stanaland House at Huntingdon College in honor of the 1960 alumnus and his long service (since 1991) on the board of trustees, the house is home to the College's bookstore, the Scarlet & Grey Shop, and sells Hawks apparel, supplies, a few food items, and Starbucks coffee. The House was dedicated September 7, and the grand opening was held October 2.

② During 12 field trips to various Alabama sites during the spring semester, field biology students identified nearly 600 different species and met 8 professional biologists. One such trip became a defining experience for student **Noah Roberts '19**, who collected samples that looked like freshwater shrimp from a stream near Old Cahawba Prairie. The specimens were actually members of another crustacean group, the Amphipoda. **Dr. Jim Daniels**, professor of biology, posted a photo on iNaturalist, a biodiversity app. A graduate student at Florida A&M University, Andrew Cannizzaro, identified the species in the genus Synurella based on the photo. Dr. Daniels then shipped several specimens to Mr. Cannizzaro, who concluded, "This population probably represents an undescribed species." Dr. Daniels and Mr. Cannizzaro are collaborating further to describe the species. Alabama is fifth in the nation in biodiversity, making it a rich and plentiful playground for field biologists.







FALL AND WINTER SPORTS













1 FOOTBALL

The Huntingdon football team brought home its fourth conference title in five years this season. The Hawks were 7-3 in the regular season and clinched the USA South title, advancing to the NCAA playoffs for the fifth time in program history. After a victory in round one against Berry College, the Hawks lost to defending champions the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor in round two. Otis Porter '20, USA South Offensive Player of the Year and first-team All-Conference, rewrote the Hawks' receiving records this season and became the program's career leader in receptions, receiving yards, and touchdown receptions. Joining Otis on the All-Conference firstteam were running back Eric Thomas '21, offensive lineman Darrell Hixon '22, and linebacker Mal Caldwell '21. Quarterback Michael Lambert '20, offensive linemen Reed Crosby '20 and Kodee Kuncho '20, defensive lineman DeAnte' Griffith '20, and kicker Cole Starr '22 were named second-team All-Conference. Head coach Mike Turk garnered USA South Coach of the Year honors.

2 VOLLEYBALL

The volleyball team (23-15) earned its second consecutive 20-win season, reached the USA South Athletic Conference Tournament for a fourth straight season, and advanced to semifinals for the first time. Amy Tyma '21 (pictured, left) earned conference Player of the Year honors, first-team All-Conference honors for a second consecutive season, and first-team West Division honors for a third season. Amy is the first female Huntingdon student-athlete to earn USA South Player of the Year recognition in any sport since Huntingdon

joined the conference in 2013. She also became the first Huntingdon volleyball player to earn AVCA honorable mention All-Region honors during the NCAA era. Joining her on the USA South West Division team were **Addison Genard '20** (first-team), **April Reese '20** (second-team) and **Ashley Murphy '22** (second-team).

3 SOCCER

The women's soccer team reached the USA South Tournament for a fourth straight season and the men's soccer team won more games than in any season since 2003. Under first-year head coach Cliff Jordan, the Lady Hawks finished with a 6-11-2 record and reached the conference quarterfinals. Erin Cembrale '23 and Erika Gebhard '22 (pictured) earned second-team USA South West Division honors. The men posted a 7-10 record and beat in-state rival Birmingham-Southern for the first time during the NCAA era. Kelan LeBlanc '22 was named third-team All-Conference for a second straight season. Kelan, the program's NCAA-era career leader in assists, also set the program's NCAA-era season record for assists and tied the NCAA-era season record for points this year.

4 CROSS COUNTRY

In its third season of competition since restarting the program in fall 2017, the Hawks made progress under the guidance of first-year head coach Ed Wright. The program competed in six men's events and five women's events and hosted the second home meet in program history. The Huntingdon College Invitational was held Sept. 20 at Greenbrier Track.

5 BASKETBALL

The Huntingdon women's basketball team began a new era and reached new heights in the 2019–2020 season. With the retirement of Buzz Phillips, the program's winningest coach, former player and longtime assistant coach Paige Huff '08 guided the Lady Hawks to the program's best record of the NCAA era (22-5), the longest winning streak of the NCAA era (12 games), and the team's first appearance in the USA South Tournament semifinals. T.I. Duncan '19 (pictured, shooting), the program's NCAA-era career leader in assists, earned third-team All-South Region honors—the third Lady Hawk to earn All-Region recognition. T.I. also earned first-team USA South All-Conference and West Division honors, while Shaonica Thomas '20 was named second-team West Division. Six women earned Academic All-Conference recognition. The men's team reached the USA South Tournament for the first time since 2014 and finished with a 13-13 record. The Hawks won 11 of their final 19 games. Six men were named Academic All-Conference.

6 WRESTLING

The fifth-year wrestling program turned in another successful season and set a new mark with eight head-to-head victories. Huntingdon closed the season in the NCAA Division III Lower Midwest Regional Tournament. Senior **Wyatt Miller '19** (pictured) became the second Huntingdon wrestler to reach 40 career victories and five wrestlers earned Academic All-Conference honors.

SPRING SPORTS













GOLF

The No. 2-ranked men's golf team finished as the Division III national runner-up and won their first USA South Conference title. Drew Mathers '20 (pictured right), Stephen Shephard '19, Henry Gee '19 (pictured left), and Mark Connelly '19 received All-America and All-Region recognition. Drew, Stephen, Henry, and Carson Whitton '22 were also named All-Conference, with Drew earning Golfer of the Year and Carson earning Rookie of the Year. Drew, named to the Jack Nicklaus team and the second-ranked golfer in Division III, set three NCAA-era program records; won the USA South Tournament; and placed third in the national tournament. Stephen, a Jack Nicklaus Award finalist, set two NCAA-era program records. Director of Golf Dave Schrever '89 was named the Golf Coaches Association of America's Division III South Region Coach of the Year and USA South Coach of the Year. Henry, Stephen, and Drew were named Academic All-America Scholars, eight men earned Academic All-Conference, and the team earned the GCAA Team Academic Award. The 11th-year women's team was ranked in the top-25 for most of the spring season. Vanessa Leiterman '19, an All-America Scholar, became the second Lady Hawk to earn All-Region honors. Three women earned Academic All-Conference.

2 BASEBALL

Hawks baseball climbed as high as 10th in Division III and reached 20 wins for the 14th time in 15 seasons under head coach **D.J. Conville** '98. The Hawks achieved their longest winning

streak of the NCAA era with 17 games. Returning to the USA South Tournament for a fourth consecutive season, the team finished with a 24-16 record. Shortstop Wes Powell '20 (pictured) earned All-Conference honors and was named second-team All-Region. Pitcher Wallace Henry '20 earned second-team All-Conference honors and Tucker Duke '22 was named the USA South Rookie Pitcher of the Year. Sixteen players were named Academic All-Conference.

SOFTBALL

The softball team set an NCAA-era program record for wins and reached the USA South Tournament for a sixth consecutive season, finishing with a 31-15 record, and reaching 30 wins for the first time during the NCAA era. Madison Hunt '20 and Annie Nolan '22 were named first-team All-Conference and West Division. Alyssa Singleterry '19 (pictured), Rayne Ellis '19, Lauren Melton '21, and Madison Perryman '21 were named second-team West Division. Eleven players were named Academic All-Conference.

4 TENNIS

The women's tennis team earned its 15th consecutive winning season with a 14-5 record and advanced to the USA South Tournament for a sixth straight season. Josie Waddell '19 (pictured) was named first-team All-Conference and first-team West Division and Zoya Robinson '19 (first-team) and Alex Burnham '22 (second-team) were West Division selections. Josie is the program's first two-time first-team All-Conference selection in the USA South. She broke the program's NCAA-era

record for career doubles victories. Five Lady Hawks were named Academic All-Conference and ITA Scholar Athletes. This was the 14th time since 2004 the Lady Hawks were recognized as an ITA All-Academic team. On the men's side, the Hawks had a 10-10 record but missed a trip to the conference tournament.

5 LACROSSE

The eighth-year men's lacrosse team finished with a 12-7 record and a return trip to the USA South Tournament championship game. The Hawks won a second consecutive regular-season title, but lost the tournament title to Piedmont. The loss was the Hawks' first against a USA South team in the two seasons the conference has sponsored men's lacrosse. Sam Hitt '19, Adrian Harper '19, and Matt Murphy '19 were named first-team All-Conference, Raymond Edwards '21 was named second-team All-Conference, and eight Hawks earned Academic All-Conference honors. The young women's lacrosse team finished with a 4-12 record. Seven Lady Hawks earned Academic All-Conference honors.

6 BEACH VOLLEYBALL

With a schedule that included only three Division III matches, the third-year Hawks earned a 4-15 record, winning against Division I (Nicholls State), Division II (Carson-Newman), Division III (Principia), and NAIA (William Carey) opponents. Nine women were named Academic All-Conference. Pictured: Nichole LeFevre '19.

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Legacy Gift

After graduating from Huntingdon, Josie Parker Greene '44 earned a graduate degree in psychiatric

social work from the University of Georgia. She served as director of the consultation and education unit of the Central Georgia Community Mental Health Center in Macon, Ga., providing counseling, marriage and family therapy, and training for law enforcement staff dealing with mentally disturbed individuals. After retiring, she worked part-time as a counselor for local mental health services. She was passionate about services for the mentally challenged, and she fought diligently on their behalf. She was instrumental in securing the funds to build the mental health facility in Cordele, Ga. The building was completed in July 2000 and dedicated in her honor. According to her obituary, "Josie Greene made a difference because she never shied away from a challenge. She might have stepped on a few toes, but she got things done. She was small in stature but big in life." Josie received the Alumni Loyalty Award in 2000. A faithful donor to the College, she designated gifts to 29 family members and four institutions in her estate plans, including Huntingdon College. Her gift was unrestricted.

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

Dr. Frank Buckner, Professor Emeritus of Religion and Philosophy

Thirty years of Huntingdon College students remember the Rev. Dr. Frank W. Buckner Jr., professor emeritus of religion and philosophy, who joined the Huntingdon faculty in 1987 after serving as a United Methodist pastor in North Carolina and remained on faculty until his retirement in 2017. Loved and admired equally for his teaching

abilities and for his humble, gentle spirit, Dr. Buckner died June 15, 2019, in Montgomery at age 69.

Huntingdon President J. Cameron West said, "Frank Buckner was my friend before he became my colleague—we both were educated at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill in our undergraduate years and at Duke University for our graduate degrees—and then reconnected when I came to Huntingdon as president in 2003. Frank had a reputation of encouraging students to think more widely, deeply, and fully. Students emerged from his classes having re-examined the faith-information they had inherited or learned from others and having claimed a new level of faith and understanding that was all their own. He was a tremendous

person, a gifted teacher, and a treasured colleague. The Huntingdon family will miss him dearly."

Dr. Buckner earned his Ph.D. in theology at the Divinity School, Duke University. In addition to 30 years of service on the Huntingdon faculty, he served as College chaplain, associate provost, department chair, division chair, and shepherded many Huntingdon Plan travel-study trips abroad. He was fluent in seven languages, including Chinese, French, German, Greek, Biblical Hebrew, and Latin. He was awarded Huntingdon's Julia Lightfoot Sellers teaching award two times, as well as the Winn and Gordon Chappell Academic Enrichment Award and the UMC General Board for Higher Education and Ministry's Exemplary Teacher Award. Upon his retirement, his faculty peers voted that he receive emeritus status. He was honored with the College's Rhoda Coleman Ellison Distinguished Faculty Lifetime Service Award during 2017 Commencement Exercises.

"Frank dedicated his entire college teaching career to Huntingdon College, and our students and alumni are the better for it," said President West. "He loved teaching so much, he also taught for his church, First UMC-Montgomery. He made a tremendous impact on minds and lives."

The family designated that memorial gifts be made to the Frank W. Buckner Scholarship Fund, Huntingdon College.

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
